International Back to Back Wool Challenge

The West Carleton Fibre Guild has invited/challenged us to participate in this event. It is an international competition with awards for fastest team worldwide, winning Canadian Team and for the greatest donation to Cancer Research by a group associated with an International Wool Challenge venue. It will take place on Sunday, June 10th, 2007. A team of 7 hand spinners and knitters complete a sweater following the same pattern within 8 hours from a fleece shorn that morning. It would take place in Carleton Place at the Wool Growers Co-op and Ross Creighton would be the blade shearer for the event. The winning Canadian team in 2006 was the Toronto Spiders Team. If you are a spinner and can knit and would be interested in participating in this event (either joining a team from WCFG or having our own OVWSG team to challenge them), contact Cindy O'Gorman at 613-832-9316 or cgo244@yahoo.ca. We have an entry form and it must be returned by April 30.

<u>Objective</u>: To complete the sweater, following the identical International Wool Challenge pattern EXACTLY, within 1 day.

Rules:

- 1. A Team consists of 8 members: 1 blade shearer and 7 handspinners and hand knitters with up to 7 non-electric spinning wheels. 1 sheep any colour or breed, but must not be housed or coated for 2 months prior to shearing.
- 2. With the exception of the shearer, team members shall be allowed to perform whichever function is required within the team. Eg. a member may start as a spinner and become a knitter, knitters or spinners may wind wool, members of the team may exchange roles with one another.
- 3. The continuous time starts when the shearer, holding the sheep, begins shearing. Shearing can begin from any part of the sheep.
- 4. An independent timekeeper and assessor are required to verify the time and that the pattern has been complied with.
- 5. Spinners may start spinning as soon as the wool is available.
- 6. Only the team members may touch the wool.
- 7. Scissors, handcarders, flickers or combs are not permitted.
- 8. A HAND ball winder tool may be used.
- 9. Two wool singles are plyed for a 'double knit' of approximately 8 ply yarn.
- 10. Use oversew stitch in wool to sew up the sweater.
- 11. Time ends when the completed sweater is handed to the timekeeper.

12. The winning team shall be the one which produces the finished sweater in the best recorded time.

Note: All tasks to be carried out by hand operation only.
