Summer Weaving Project?

Coverlets on the 100" Loom. Have you drooled over the wonderful coverlets Jack Lane has revealed at Show & Tell? Well, this may be your opportunity to have your very own creation.

Jack has offered to be an adviser for a coverlet project on the 100" Loom. Since the workshop classroom will soon be available to us at all times of the day and most of the regular workshops will be over for the summertime. It has been suggested that we could set up the 100" loom for a summer project. This loom requires 2 people to operate, so pairs of weavers would work on a coverlet. In the past, an extra item (in this case a coverlet) was woven off to donate to the guild, in lieu of loom rental costs.

Requirements: Participants would have to agree on a threading pattern and warp material & colour. All participants would share the warp material costs and then provide their own weft material. The

project would have to be completed by the end of the summer, so that the loom could be dismantled again, in preparation for the fall workshop sessions.

Note: A ruling was made a while ago that this loom is not to be set up until the warp is completed and ready to be installed on the loom.

If you are interested in joining this project, please submit your name to Laurie and (provided we have enough participants), a planning meeting can be arranged.

Resource Centre News

Resource Centre executive decision

As you now know, the workshop classroom is now located down the hall from the library. Though there are still some deficiencies to be completed, the space is coming together nicely.

One of the creative solutions regarding the new RC classroom was that Moe suggested that the ESL (English as a Second Language) may be able to relocate to another space in HH, thus allowing the Guild to have complete access to the classroom. This sharing of space with ESL has been an asset to us in the past in helping with rental costs. Your executive, after deliberation over costs, space and ease of use (regarding the new classroom) voted to accept Moe's suggestion. Therefore, in early May,

Heartwood House will construct a new class area for ESL, and they will then move to their own space. This will allow the guild free-er movement of weaving equipment, without impeding another group's use of the room.

Changes to Resource Centre equipment storage

Across from the new classroom are 2 closets, which now house small equipment such as table looms, small warping mills etc. The little hallway in front of the library door will soon have bifold doors installed, which will isolate the hallway for guild use, from the rest of the room.

Heartwood House is creating a storage room for guild equipment, just around the corner from the new RC workshop classroom. This will house items/small equipment that are only used once or twice a year. This will free up more library and classroom space, making for improved ease of use. Both the closets and new storage room are being made available to us free of charge by HH.

In preparation for this new storage room I spent a weekend sorting through the library "stuff". I had a huge pile of boxes and equipment which were moved temporarily to the HH Dungeon are. All this will be moved into the new storage room as soon as it is completed (by end of May). P.S. An inventory list was prepared at the same time, thus tackling 2 jobs at once. Sorting of equipment continues, as we tackle the little hallway outside the library next.

RC Coordinator move

It was moved and passed at the last Executive meeting that the Resource Centre Coordinator position should be moved from "Committee" level to the "Executive Committee" level. The increasing responsibilities warranted the move.

This means we are getting more and more requests for our services to demonstrate our skills and sometimes even sell our creations. Back to Back Wool Competition:

This event involves spinning raw fleece, without carding, to 2 ply yarn which is knitted into a universal pattern sweater. It is taking place on Saturday May 10 at Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, Carleton Place starting at 9:00. Kay James from the West Carleton Fibre Guild is organizing it and there is one team now and we are looking for

another to keep us company and cheer us on. We have the timer, runners, and the blade shorn fleece for two or three teams. If you would like to come and just spin or knit, that would be helpful. We use 3.25 and 4.00 straight needles in a very simple pattern of a boat neck and long sleeved sweater. We have some members who would prefer to only spin but happy to give other knitters a rest. The Wool Growers is advertising this and it is another opportunity to showcase what we can do for fun. Believe me, it is all fun!!!!!

20th Anniversary of the Symmes Inn Museum in Aylmer for June 8th 2008:

Danielle Potvin, president of a traditional rug making guild in Gatineau is looking for artisans to demonstrate their (old) trades in period costumes on that day between 10:00 to 16:00. They are hoping to get some funding from the city but in the meantime, it would be on a volunteer basis, although artisans could sell their work on site during the event. It is far from a regular landlord/tenant arrangement. We work together for the good of all HH members and groups. We have shared space with other groups such as ESL and several other occasions groups have rented our room on an afternoon that we were not using it. We have used other groups' space for some of our events and we have shared equipment from other groups as well. We participate in Heartwood activities like the Christmas party and gallery shows. We assist HH in fund-raising events such as the OC Transpo unclaimed items sale and the Everybody Wins computer recycling program. Why? Because we all benefit! We are privileged to be a part of this wonderful community.

What do we get by being a Heartwooder member group?

- -central location on a bus route with a bus stop right outside the door $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right)$
- -security
- -wheel chair accessibility
- -elevator
- -reception desk which provides our members access to our room during the day and security
- -free, secure mail box
- -parking lot
- -Gallery for meetings and shows plus other groups rooms to expand into, if necessary, such as the little PWC kitchen and Aphasia room
- -Washroom facilities, clean and stocked
- -recycling, garbage pickup and facility cleaning and maintenance
- -door lock buzzer system with security camera at the side door $% \left\{ 1,2,\ldots ,n\right\}$
- -free phone service as we use the HH Fax line as
- -shared equipment between groups, such as projectors, flip charts, dollies, tables and chairs -renovations and maintenance generally covered by
- HH, we have had to pay for very little
- -access to shared programs such as the Big Online program, which we would never have been able to afford on our own. By teaming up with the other HH groups we made this program affordable for all of us -the HH volunteers are always willing to help us out with manpower etc.

And most of all: Maureen (Moe) who is the Executive Director of HH. She is willing to help with ANY problems and works hard to problem solve with us. She has bent over backwards to help us lately and is a fantastic asset to our guild. She is as big a guild supporter as any of us.

The spirit of cooperativeness is what our guild is all about. We have found ourselves a similar community where we fit in nicely. Let's all celebrate the community that we belong to.

HH PARKING - Daytime (to 5 pm)

Heartwood House and Beth Shalom Synagogue have been dealing with a lot of unauthorized use of their parking facilities and therefore HH has had to initiate parking regulations and ticketing. Parking lot changes to take effect on May lst. As of this date all unauthorized vehicles parked on HH or BS property will be ticketed and towed. Therefore, during the day we must use the designated Visitors parking, located along the fence at the Beth Shalom entrance or in the gravelled area by the dumpster. More gravel will be installed once it dries out a bit more and Visitor parking signs will be erected soon as well.

>From MOE (HH Exec. Director): "Please make certain that all visitors park along the fence or in the parking area behind the dumpster. Visitors must register their vehicles in the journal (red binder) at the front desk. John (in charge of parking) will use our daily visitor registry to check cars in the lot. Visitors will be ticketed if their vehicles are not registered in our journal."

The paved parking lot is for HH groups who have paid a monthly parking fee. They will now have parking passes in their car windows.

Suggestion: Put a note on your dash that says "Heartwood Visitor – Guild" just to be safe. In case you forget to sign the visitor parking log.

HH PARKING Evening (after 5 pm)

We are allowed to use the paved parking area after 5 pm. By then, a lot of the daytime HH users are leaving for the day. Suggestion: Again, just to be safe, put a note on your dash, as mentioned above.

- -Jack showed us another completed coverlet, the pattern was by Dorothy Burnham " Garden Pattern" 4 shaft woven in brown with blue background.
- -Ann Sunahara showed a gift her husband has made to the Guild: a spreadsheet program which allows a user to enter the final width of a piece being woven, to have the program calculate the width of stripes in the proportions of a Fibonacci series for the total width.
