We invite all weavers, spinners, dyers, and basketmakers around the world to join together in celebration of our common heritage during Spinning & Weaving Week. Each year, during the first week in October, we celebrate the traditions and the future of our fiber arts and crafts. Join us as we demonstrate handweaving and handspinning, exhibit works of fiber techniques, and teach our children about their fiber heritage. Also check out <u>www.weavezine.com</u> to learn how to make a backstrap loom from stuff around the house. No excuse not to try your hand at weaving. At our last meeting, I suggested that members might like to participate in study groups with likeminded people on a variety of topics. So far, we have:

Pleats, Puckers and Bumps Study Group - Mentor Francesca Overend

The purpose of this study group is to introduce the exciting world of texture, folds and ripples, which can be woven into cloth. At least two sessions are involved. The first will cover the literature available to obtain three-dimensional effects on cloth; we will review the effects which can be obtained through weave structure, through the use of particular yarns, and /or through a the combination of these two with "shibori on the loom" techniques. Pictures and samples will be used whenever possible. At the end of this first session, participants will decide on the type of sample(s) they will weave, and weave these samples at home. The group will meet again some two weeks later to look at the samples, discuss any what ifs which may come up, and possible end uses.

The study group may schedule a further session, if there is a need. As to timing, I am thinking this could take place sometime after mid-November, and I will try for a Monday evening say 7 to 9, at the RC. Costs will involve materials only. I will have some specialty yarns available for purchase, but participants may also use their own suitable yarns. Prerequisites: the ability to dress a loom and read patterns. Access to an eight shaft loom is preferable, but I will have a few four shaft drafts available as well. If any additional information is needed, please let me know. Francesca.

Program:

Hands-on paper making with Maggie McGovern. Tonight we are learning about the art of making paper by dipping our hands into a vat of pulp to pull our sheets. Maggie will help us mold our paper into a vessel which we will take home to dry and decorate.

In order to benefit fully, there are a few things to bring for this evening's learning experience: -a sponge – this needs to be one that holds water well, not the plasticy kind but the kind that is hard when dry

-a small plastic shape on which you will mold your paper such as a cup, bowl or yoghurt container – maximum diameter about 3 inches if flat, but less if October 2009

the container is deep a towel for sopping up extra water

-a bag to carry your creation home Maggie McGovern has deep roots in Ottawa and has been expressing her creativity in book and paper arts for over ten years. She is an active participant in several local studio tours and art shows, including the Red Trillium Studio Tour and the Maple Run Studio Tour, displaying her books, boxes and other paper arts made with her own handmade multi-fibred papers. Hand-woven & Felted Items on Etsy

On the Etsy E-Commerce site, I searched for sellers of hand woven or felted materials. For you to see the results of my search go to <u>WWW.etsy.com</u> and scroll down from "Handmade" to "Sellers" and type in a selected name.

For example, "froggyfibers" will give you a site of a person who since November 2005 has made over 100 sales from the Etsy shop of that name. Sections included in this store are Spindles, Handspun and Dyed Fibers. Check out the work of this fiber artist.

Another seller is named "landeflor." She says, "I dye the wool myself and love the felting process from beginning to end." From May 2006 she has made over 400 sales of her felted products on Etsy.

"vart" is another seller. Her Nuno Felted Shawl – Black Elegance lives up to its descriptive name.

One last seller to tempt you to explore Etsy for yourself has a store named "sugarplumoriginals." Her Nuno Felted Shawl is very eye catching and is offered for sale at \$599.00 US.

I have just returned from the Mississippi Valley Textile Museum after viewing the Ottawa Valley Weavers and Spinners Guild display there. The work there matches or exceeds in beauty and quality the work I have seen on Etsy shops. Program 1997

Denise Atkinson

Spent several Months in Bhutan, she was asked to go and teach creative weaving. Their Crafts People create art work, crafts and woven articles all in the same style, and same patterns. We saw her film on the countryside and the people who live there. 80% of the people wear hand woven silk that is complex and intricate and can be confused with embroidery. They wear silk on Silk clothing with running shoes on their feet They weave on male and female looms which indicates the size the loom (length of the Pipe that is used) They weave and wear mostly cotton, silk, wool, yak and some imported fibres. Bhutan is in the High Himalayas and has a land mass about the size of Northern Ontario, the people consist of many different nationalities, they all speak about 6-7 languages and are primarily Buddhist.
