Message from your President

I have been thinking of things like "gratitude". One of the lists I belong to has been having a lively discussion about guilds and what they mean to people.

The internet is an incredible resource, allowing people with diverse interests in far-flung corners of the globe to actually discuss in, not exactly real time, but much faster than 20 years ago when you had letters (and a sometimes 6 week wait for a response)or expensive long distance telephone as communication tools.

Ralph Griswold did an enormous service to the weaving community by gathering "rare" or just plain informative books, scanning them and posting them to a website. After his death, a group of people took on the job to continue his work so that these books will not be lost or even particularly difficult to find.

Thinking about this project got me thinking about the (mostly) women who, during the middle and late part of the 20th century learned as much as they could, then wrote and taught anyone who was interested, about weaving. They also did an enormous service to the weaving community for without them, there would not likely be the guild organization that exists (in North America) and very probably, I would never have discovered the joys of weaving cloth.

At any rate, I have spent much of today cultivating an attitude of gratitude - something we sometimes forget to do in our hectic daily lives.....

You will notice at the meeting that our closet end of the room has been renovated. We hope that this will help in ease of finding materials for our students as well as a neat, efficient way to store seldom used items for demos, displays, etc. Come take a look. We are also looking into purchasing some display equipment to be used for shows and demos. We will be refurbishing the existing equipment, selling off excess things and purchasing some new items, namely, another spinning wheel and a multi-shaft loom. Mandy Heggtveit has completed the grant application for the City of Ottawa, and hopefully, we will receive news soon in order to accomplish some of these changes.

GOOD NEWS - NEW BOOKS (shown last meeting at show and tell)

Intertwined: The Art of Handspun Yarn, Modern Patterns, and Creative Spinning by Lexi Boeger.

This is a book on art spinning. It goes beyond the even perfect yarn that has been long aspired to and embraces many ways to make textured yarn. There are many wild yarn suggestions in the book. Some may even inspire a weaver to create something new and wonderful! This book was generously donated by Heather Orpana of Ottawa Valley Fiber Arts.

Weave your wardrobe by Ankaret Dean.

This is a book on weaving for garment construction and simple patterns well suited for the loom. She has a chapter on special techniques including instructions on paddle warping, finger weaving, four strand braid and ikat. This book was donated by Jan Scott who purchased it from Siobhan Baker.

Temari: How to Make Japanese Thread Balls by Diana Vandervoort

This is a book all about making tamari balls! It may inspire you to do something new and exciting with your thrums from weaving or little bits of samples of exotic fibers you have spun but can't think what to do with (since your fibre sample binder is full!) We did not previously have any books on this topic and I had previously had inquiries for information about how to make them. I was able to get this book very cheaply on E-Bay for us.

This February 2010, Spins & Needles, in collaboration with the National Capital Commission (NCC), is calling on artists, crafters and the public, individuals and groups, of all ages, and all creative levels to be part of the Winterlude Urban Cozy Project.

Various warm coverings, or cozies, wrapped around trees, lampposts, and other urban elements will be installed on two major festival sites. The intervention will remix warmth, cold, art, craft, music and the city, and also play with traditional images and conceptions associated with a country known around the world for it's cold weather climate.

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Makers from the Ottawa region, across Canada, and beyond are invited to contribute cozies.. They can be traditional sewed/knitted/crocheted ones or also more novel creations. Once we receive a cozy, it will be labelled with the maker's name(s) and city or residence, and installed at one of the two Winterlude sites. Photos will be posted on the Spins & Needles site and Flickr so that cozy makers can connect with one another. Plus if the cozy is something to talk about, we'll profile it and the person on the Spins & Needles blog as well!

Cozies must be received by February 10, 2010.

Other ways of participating include: cozy installation, photography, social media, workshop assistance, and donation of cozy-appropriate materials.

Jacquard Workshop with Louise Lemieux Bérubé

Schedule for 2010

Advanced jacquard workshop with a six-color warp (tapestry warp) :

A one-week workshop : from July 5th to 9th, 2010 Cost : 400\$ cad (material included). Study of tapestry weaves and other complex weaves using a six-color warp. Additional instruction for special case issues pertaining to personal projects. Designing and weaving different samples. Possibility to leave complete designs to be woven after workshop.

Introduction (1) to Jacquard weaving:

A one-week workshop : from August 9th to 13th, 2008 Cost : 400\$ cad (material included). Introduction to Jacquard weaving. Study of simple and some complex weaves. Adaptation of a scanned image into a usable form for a woven interpretation. Designing and weaving different samples. Possibility to leave complete designs to be woven after workshop.

Intermediate (2) to Jacquard weaving:

A one-week workshop : from August 16th to 20th, 2008 Cost : 400\$ cad (material included). Study of complex weaves, including different ratio wefts, mixing two complex weaves, etc. Additional instruction for special case issues pertaining to personal projects. Designing and weaving different samples. Possibility to leave complete designs to be woven after workshop.

General information :

- Jacquard weaving is done on two fully computerized Jacquard handlooms and Pointcarré software is used. Photoshop is also used for special design effects and composition.

- The warp on our loom consists of 1728 threads set at 40 epi for the Introduction and Intermediate workshops workshops and at 84 epi for the Advanced six-color warp workshop.

- The computer lab and the weaving workshops are accessible at night and during weekends.
