Message from your President

With the 2011 Exhibition and Sale successfully behind us and two major workshops under the belt our Guild will turn its focus on two important challenges: the move of the Resource Centre and the coordination of the Ontario Handweavers and Spinners (OHS) 2013 Conference in Cornwall, themed *Optical Illusions*.

Preparations for the move of Heartwood House and with it, most likely, of our Resource Centre are underway. Ann Sunahara is a member of the Heartwood House relocation committee and I joined the fundraising committee. Being part of committees will allow the Guild to keep fully informed, contribute to the location selection and have input in the decision making process. What the Guild must do shortly is to establish its own relocation committee and most probably subcommittees with responsibilities for the library and storage facilities. To make the move as painless as possible, insofar as moves can be, the Executive will call on all able-bodied members to help with the preparations and ultimately the move. I should add that we will be hiring a mover to relocate the entire inventory thus actual carrying of boxes is will not be required of members. The move is expected to take place sometime over the next 6 - 9 months and you will be kept fully informed.

Thankfully, the time frames for the 2013 OHS Conference and the relocation of the Resource Centre do not coincide. By the time the Guild is installed in the new facility preparations for the Conference will begin to heat up and require our full attention. Our Laurie Harkin Chiasson and Margot Dixon of the Carmen Forward Guild are the Co-Chairs for the Conference and already busy with getting things rolling. Most Guilds in Eastern Ontario accepted to take on a specific Conference responsibility: the West Carleton Guild will look after registration, Bellville after the juried exhibition, and our Guild is responsible for selecting the keynote speakers and workshop presenters. Having the task to select speakers and workshop leaders provides our Guild with the opportunity to come up with an exciting Conference program that will attract conferees from beyond Eastern Ontario. Since Cornwall is located close to the Ontario – Quebec border we will make every effort to offer a program that will appeal to weavers and spinners in both provinces. The call for submissions for workshops will be announced in the winter issue of OHS's *Fibre Focus* and you are invited to suggest names of potential workshop leaders.

To get going on the preparations for the 2013 Conference Laurie Harkin-Chiasson is calling a meeting for 6:30 on January 9th, i.e. one hour before the January Guild meeting and I encourage everyone to attend (please see Laurie's notice further on in the Bulletin for more information).

Based on the above, 2012 promises to be anything but boring for our Guild. I don't know if I ever mentioned that our Guild is unique not only in Ontario but Canada and maybe even North America. Whereas most guilds are losing members left, right and centre due to demographics, our Guild continues to be active and grow. With the two very diverse projects ahead of us over the next 1½ years, we have a reputation to uphold and I am convinced that if we all work together we will not disappoint

Please bring your books back before the meeting since the librarians would really like to participate in the meeting and enjoy the mid meeting brake with you.



Fleece and Fibre Sourcebook, more than 200 fibres from animal to spun yarn

This is a fascinating book packed with information.

when I was checking various types of fibre-bearing animals was arctic hare but there is a wonderful section on angora rabbits. if you are interested in making your own fibre binder this will be a greateplace to start. If you have found a wonderful wild new to you fibre and would like some information on it its likely in here too. This looks like it will keep us busy for a while just checking out all the pictures!

Hand spinning Rare Wools (DVD)

Deborah Robson explores fibre from 38 rare and



endangered breeds of sheep from Great Britain and North America. She gives a history, characteristics of each breed and gives tips on their preparation and spinning. She has an engaging way of explaining her subject and was thoroughly enjoyable to watch. She is extremely passionate about preserving the rare

breeds as a necessity for the future health of sheep breads in general. she had an extremely intriguing idea for using a cat litter box as a fibre tool, I won't say more but you have got to check this DVD out! Some of the breeds she covers are (from interweave lists):

- Northern European short-tailed sheep (plus an intriguing mystery breed)
- Old British breeds introduced in Roman times
- Rare English long wools
- Classic English Down breeds
- Welsh and Border breeds
- American originals
- American feral and semi-ferals.

Spinning for Lace (DVD), Tried and true methods for spinning fine yarns from merino and more From Interweaves web site:



Do you long to spin cobweb-fine threads that are both lively and durable? Meet Margaret Stove. Her methods might seem counterintuitive, but they work! A great advocate of the fine Merinos of her native New Zealand, Margaret is fearless in creating plied blends using silk, angora, qivuit, and more.

Learn how to:

- Handle a fine fleece without felting it
- Wash by the lock with shocking vigour and efficiency
- Adjust your wheel tension for exquisite delicacy
- Ply a balanced yarn, or tweak your hand positions for plying different fibres together

Plus, see how to choose and sort a fleece, separate spin-able staples, dissolve the grease, manage the staple to avoid felting and maximize durability and "bounce." Using high magnifications of the fibres and spun yarns, Margaret explains just how it all works.

Always wanted to go to India?

Linda of Rose Haven Farm Store is traveling in January and February in India and would welcome a room mate for the Gujarat and Assam parts of her trip. I have already made arrangements for a textile trip in Gujarat that includes: The Calico Museum in Ahmedabad, block & screen printing in Jetpur, Watson Museum at Rajkot, Bhujodi, the home of Chamam Premji, the Indian master weaver that OHS sponsored several years ago, Kal Rashka Training School in Bhuj, Rabari & Bhungas embroidery near Mandvi, tie & dye work of Bandhani, Rabari embroideries in the Kutch, Patola silk textiles and double-ikat weaving in Patan. I will have a private car & driver so we will be very flexible. Accommodation is sometimes modest but also with a few very neat places, like a tented camp on a beach and mud huts in the Kutch, as well as Heritage Palaces. This part of my trip <u>leaves Delhi on February 3</u> arriving Ahmedabad early evening by plane. The trip runs to February 14 when we fly back to Delhi. This part of the trip would cost a

roommate about \$1000 including the return flight. Many meals are not included but these are not costly. When in Delhi, the plan is to go to the Mela, on Feb. 15, its last day. This is a huge crafts fair just outside of Delhi.

Then the plan is to go on to Assam by flight on Feb. 16 and stay in a lodge to visit the Kaziranga National Park, home of the one-horned rhino and elephant riding! Following this, I intend to visit the village of Sualkuchi, very close to Guwahati, the main city in Assam. This village is renowned for silk production, mainly by hand and their specialty is Muga silk. This part of the trip ought to cost around \$500 - 600. Still working on some details. The trip ends on February 21st in Delhi, then one takes a flight home likely the next day.

I really would welcome someone who has the time to travel, has a passport, likes textiles, can get some shots - not many needed, likes adventure and is open-minded - after all this is India! The costs for these 2 segments are not high because I have already booked them as a single person and a second person makes the costs lower for both. The costs do not include airfare to India which is around \$1100 - 1200 return. I am flying out of Montreal.

If anyone getting this newsletter is at all interested, please email or call me as soon as possible. I would love a companion and this is a very cost effective opportunity, about 1/2 the cost for Russ Mason's trip. Look forward to calls and emails.

Wool Growers Co-operative	 Carleton Place site purchased in1940 and head quarters centralized there in 1967. The Real Wool Shop retail outlet opened in 1979. There is also additional retail to the agricultural industry in the form of various animal & agricultural products. The majority of Canadian wool is shipped to Carleton Place where it is graded, sorted and sold to woollen mills internationally. 					
Eric Bjergso, General Manager	 Over 40% of the world's wool is exported to China; 60-79% of Carleton Place wool is sold to China. Website includes breeder listings if interested in particular type of fleece. "Lambsdown Park Festival" is held in June each year. There is a premium fleece division that caters to handspinners.
