Message from your President

Mandy Heggtveit

I recently had the good fortune to meet an extraordinary man. Hiroyuki Shindo is a Japanese textile artist who dedicated the last 50 years to work exclusively with indigo. He uses natural indigo, fermented with ash, lime, bran and sake in vats sunk into the earth floor or what was once the farmhouse kitchen. His work is in the collection of the Art Institute of Chicago, the American Craft Museum in New York, the Stedelijk Museum in Amsterdam, the Israel Museum in Jerusalem and now the Canadian Museum of Civilization (CMC).

During one of our conversations while driving to the Textile Museum in Almonte Mr. Shindo told me that he is in the process of developing yardage with a Shibori effect (needless to say through the indigo vat process) without wrapping fabric with thread because, due to the traditionally time consuming process, this is no longer affordable for young people to make their kimonos. I then told him about woven Shibori, since its concept parallels his own thinking, and he became extremely interested in it. I showed Mr. Shindo Catherine Ellis's book and he will order it for himself once he is back in Japan (although Mr. Shindo does not consider himself to be a weaver he is fully knowledgeable about all of weaving's technical implications).

Mr. Shindo's stellar career is in itself to be admired. But there were two other aspects that I found so exceptional. Firstly there was his modesty, openness to new ideas and curiosity that I found so inspirational. And secondly, I so admire him for dedicating his career to one single aspect of his craft. His continuing research into indigo dying led him to reveal the essence of a process and ultimately to superbly beautiful works of art.

You can see Mr. Shindo's work in the recently opened exhibition *Tradition, Innovation* a fabulous show that draws parallels between work produced during Japan's Edo period and contemporary Japanese design and craft. If you go, I suggest you wear good shoes since passing through the exhibition takes time; there is so much to see and to read.

It is somewhat unusual to think about starting a new Guild year in May - June just before most of us take off to pursue our summer activities. In our mind, the new Guild year begins in September as we return recharged and full of energy. There will be a revised slate of programs and workshops for the coming months, deadlines for challenges and preparations for the Exhibition of Sale. However, the advantage of beginning our year now allows us to use the summer months to not only develop programming but also for all of us to consider two things:

- what and where do we see the Guild to be five years from now (2016) and how we will accomplish this, and,
- on a more personal note, what are our own aspirations in developing our practice over the next five years.

The results of the two surveys and your continued input will assist us in arriving at a long-term vision and strategies for the Guild. As to our practice and in terms of our own growth intellectually, aesthetically and technically the development of a personal five-year plan is a good idea.

I hope to see all of you at the June meeting; it should be a good one! And if I you can't make it – have a wonderful summer and I look forward to seeing you in September.

There are still workshops coming up in June & July, most of which have space left:

<u>Sat June 11: Plying</u> - Learn to put two and three or more singles together to make a balanced yarn. 10am-4pm \$40

<u>Sun June 12: Intro to Inkle Weaving</u> - this simple loom makes a wide range of bands, straps and trims 10am-3pm \$40

<u>Sun June 19: Spinning Rainbows</u> - fibre blending for colour effects using hand and drum carding. 9am-4pm \$60

<u>Sat June 25: Intro to Rigid Heddle Weaving</u> - this simple loom is easy to warp, portable and more versatile than you think. 9:30-4 \$50

<u>Sun June 26: Nuno Felting</u> - felt doesn't have to be heavy, learn to make light drapey felt fabrics using wool and silk. 10am-4pm \$40

Mon, Wed and Fri, July 11-15: Rugs! Sample lots of techniques for making rugs on all types of looms.

Please, take pity on your registrar and the instructors and register quickly and completely. Unless I receive payment or arrangements for payment are made you are not considered registered. Workshop I

Topic: The Big Overshot

Date: October 1 – 2, 2011-05-31

workshop:

Overshot is a familiar traditional weave associated with sweet patterns. What happens when this twill based structure meets all the new concepts coming from twills? Advancing overshot is one way to make large scale designs without increasing the

length of the floats. Explore the advantages of overshot and give an old friend a new place to grow. We will use new, decidedly non-traditional threading with many different die-up and treadling options. Overshot threading are great for collapsible fabric, loom-controlled shibori, velveteen, deflected double weave, honeycomb, lace, and swivel. For intermediate to advanced weavers using 8 or more shafts at home, this workshop can accept some 4-shaft looms. Work at your own loom.

Workshop II

Topic: Opposites Attract Date: October 4 – 7, 2011

This is what Bonnie's website says about this workshop:

Create bold, colourful designs that emphasize your warp yarn with parallel (opposite) threading. Echo weave and turned taqueté are a wonderful choice for two or more warp colours and a single weft. Compare woven examples and learn tips for weaving, sett, and yarn choice. Taqueté has a long history and echo weave is modern. Both are wonderful for shawls, scarves, garments, and art pieces. On the same warp, make samples of warp rep and an exciting kind of double weave that produces four colours with two shuttles. Explore these structures while learning methods for creating your own designs for the fabric of your dreams, including drafts with curves and organic shapes. 3 – 4 days, intermediate through very advanced, mainly for weavers using 8 and more shafts at home but a few 4 shaft looms may be used in the workshop.

Workshop Fees

The Guild applied for a grant from the Canada Council's Jean A. Chalmers Fund to contribute to

the costs of running the workshops. The workshops fees cannot be determined until we hear if our grant application was successful or not – probably not before the end of June or early July. A good number of weavers from our Guild as well as nonmembers expressed great interest in the workshops and enrolment is limited. As soon as we know if we received the grant or not we will advise you of the full amount of the workshops fees and balances owning.

Dyeing Workshops for the SummerWEAK ACID DYEING

Introducing spinners, weavers and knitters to the world of colour. You will learn the basics of colour, dyeing and demystifying the formulae. A dyed colour wheel in two colour families - printers and artist primaries, will be the first project. Based on the wheels, you will learn how to mix dyes for those special colours and take home a dye reference binder, including pre-printed sample cards, recipe sheets and tons of samples.

PAINTED ROVINGS AND YARNS

Learn to create multi-coloured yarns by learning to paint rovings or yarns using weak acid dyes, then spin/weave/knit them into repeatable multi-coloured yarns/garments. You will learn how to get lots of colours in a yarn by using combinations of painted rovings. You will explore design possibilities and plan and dye rovings; you will do some spinning and plying exercises as well. Get the Kaffe Fassett look through hand-painted rovings or yarn. This is a great technique for weavers to produce truly unique garments by using painted yarns in the warp and weft.
