Guest Speaker	Bonnie Inouye: "The Big Picture". Bonnie is a very accomplished weaver with over 40 years experience. She has taught in 9 countries and won numerous awards. Some of the messages Bonnie shared with us include: Step back and view the work from a distance. Even functional items can say "wow" when viewed from a distance rather that up close. Historic textiles such as rugs, tablecloths and blankets often have large designs. As opposed to factory cloth, an individual can weave / create special purpose fabric; for example, different design pattern for sleeves on a jacket. It needs to be fun for you. Plan for the long view, add to the detail later; be happy with the process. Consider: Is there going to be an overall dominant factor; will it be texture and / or colour? A big or small design, for example, one large snowflake or many small ones? Where does the design end? Theme as accent or motif? Middle, off centre, etc.? Will linear pattern repeat, rotate, move over? Squares, stripes, circles, curves, etc., and in which direction? Will planned texture change shape; will there be differential shrinkage? What of colour – optical blending; ranges of colour? Making your own design, whether weaving, knitting, quilting, etc., gets better and easier with practise. In conclusion: Start with a mental image. View it from a distance. Note the dark and light design elements. View up close and figure out how to get there. You choose your scale. You are the maker.
