I'm now setting up a loom at the studio for Tuesday and Friday weaving. This will be my first post-workshop project. Wish me luck.



The new workshop catalogue for 2013 is finally complete and should be on the website shortly. A hard copy of the catalogue will be available at the Ex and Sale and at the Resource Centre. Jan has really outdone herself this time, the catalogue is beautiful and easy to navigate.

The uncertainty of the timing of the move made it a bit more challenging this year, so we chose to schedule mostly the core beginning weaving and spinning workshops and try a new feature "Workshop By Request" for more specific topics. What this means is that anyone who would like a workshop on a particular topic need only round up a group of 4-6 friends, relations, acquaintances or complete strangers (aka fibre friends you haven't met yet) interested in the same topic and contact the Registrar to request a workshop. The Registrar will then seek out an instructor and get back to you with possible dates and times. Once a mutually convenient time has been arranged, if there is space left we will open the workshop to the rest of the guild. We have listed many possible "by request" topics in the catalogue, but if you come up with

another topic the Registrar will do her best to find you an instructor. To help you find group members the Registrar will also set up a "lonely learners look-out". Let me know what topic you are interested in and I will try to find you fellow students. To start you off I already have someone interested in "Ceinture Flechee" or Finger Weaving. Judy Kavanagh will be instructing. If you are also interested e-mail the Registrar and I will connect you.
