President's Message

Although the cold of winter has set in I am grateful for the longer days and bright sunshine. Oftentimes it is these long cold winter days in which we are most fruitful in our art and craft. I hope your projects are progressing and the New Year has brought you some inspiration. You may find a spark of inspiration in some of the upcoming events, notices of which are in this Newsletter. Perhaps you will attend the Spin In at Chesterville or are looking beyond to the 2015 OHS Conference. Embrace what inspires you!

OHS is the Ontario Handweavers' and Spinners' and is a provincial body that provides Certificate and Masters education programs to spinners and weavers. They offer a number of events throughout the year, opportunities for learning and networking with persons such as yourselves. A quarterly publication, Fibre Focus, is also produced by OHS. I encourage you to check out their website at www.ohs.on.ca. If you have been a member in the past, consider joining again. You can now renew your membership online.

We have several vacancies on the Operational Team. First is the Fundraising Coordinator who proposes and co-ordinates activities to increase Guild income. Fundraising activities include the Rosepath Auction and the annual raffle with the draw occurring at the Exhibition and Sale. New ideas are always welcome. The second vacancy is the Publicity and Public Relations Coordinator. The person in this role works closely with the Coordinators for each the Website, Education, and the Exhibition and Sale, to ensure that all pertinent information on Guild activities is shared with the Ottawa Community. Both of these roles are important to the Guild's ongoing success. Please consider if you are able to take on some of these activities, and if so, speak directly to any member of the Executive.

A very important gap requires the immediate attention of members. A committee for deciding the prizes for this year's raffle is needed. Prizes must be stated to obtain the required license for the raffle. A committee of two to three people is needed to brainstorm and come up with two prizes – we already have a third. In the past, prizes have been valued at \$1,000,

\$600 and \$500. The value of the prizes has an impact on the license required. If prizes cannot be determined there can be no raffle. Raffle earnings are used each year to offset workshop costs. Right now we have a basket of items donated by last year's vendors and this will serve as one of the prizes. So, are there a few people that can work on a sheep to shawl project for this endeavor? Come forward with your ideas and share them with any member of the Executive.

Okay, that's all the business I need to share with you. I am excited about the newly received Wool Order that Ann McElroy with the help of Jean Sharp pulled together. I look forward to seeing everyone's finished fluff at Show and Tell. I had to dismantle my loom for my upcoming move but have the perfect sunny window picked out for it. I look forward to getting back to it soon.


During this meeting we will be discussing the results of the survey and some suggestions on how to make this event the best ever!

Workshops

The best news this month was seeing the workshop catalogue up on the website. Take some time to peruse it, we hope there is something for everyone in it. If not, take a look at the procedure for "By Request" workshops, gather some friends and relations and we will try to set something up for you. The catalogue has a registration form and registration instructions on the last page. I have finally mastered PayPal invoicing if you wish to choose that payment option.

February and March have a wide variety to offer. Full descriptions, cost etc are available in the catalogue:

Beginning Weaving with Shirley Browsky starts Feb 16, **FULL**, but there is still room in the session starting May 4.

Meet the Wheels - this is a no cost activity designed to show off, share and try out as wide a variety of spinning wheels as participants can gather. Bring your favourite wheels ready to share and some test driving fibre. This is particularly good for beginners considering a first wheel, try out a variety to see what suits you. RSVP not required. Saturday Feb 15 10-4

Wet Felted Fingerless Mitts, Cuffs or Wrist Warmers with Ann McElroy. An introduction to basic wet felting techniques which should result in a unique, wearable item. Sunday Feb 22 10-3 (Ann needs time to order your choice of colour, if you sign up less than 3 weeks ahead you'll get Ann's choice)

Intro to Spinning - Wheel, move from the spindle to the wheel, learn how wheels work and how to operate them (prerequisite Intro to Spinning - Spindle or equivalent) Saturday Mar 1 10:30-3:30

Crumb Warps with Judith Rygiel - this one is really fun, learn really good warp winding technique and how to combine odd ends of many yarns to make a vibrant warp. Saturday Mar 8 10-2

Gord and the Great Wheel with Gord Moat. Learn about the history of these wonderful wheels while learning how to use, adjust and maintain them. The Guild's great wheel has a fascinating history that Gord is currently exploring. Saturday March 15 9-12

Quiviut Study Group - Join Jan Scott in an exploration of Quiviut - one of the warmest fibres in the world (maybe we should have scheduled this for January? As I write this it is -20degC with a -32decC windchill!!) This isn't a workshop, Jan will coordinate gathering materials but participants will work together to learn, experiment and share as they explore this very Canadian fibre. You MUST sign up by Feb. 15 so that Jan can order materials. Cost will depend on materials, but it will be \$25max. Sunday March 16 is the start date, as a group, participants will decide whether to continue to meet and share their experiences.

Intro to Rigid Heddle Weaving - a one day introduction to weaving using a simple, portable loom with a lot of potential. You will weave a scarf from start to finish during this workshop. Saturday Mar 22 10-4

Gaining Control - learn to control twist, diameter and a variety of fibre types, once you can spin a yarn that holds together on a wheel you are ready for this workshop. Saturday Mar 29 10:30-4:30

Tips from Members

Removing rust on your metal equipment: Use a piece of aluminum foil dipped in a bit of Varsol. It will not scratch the surface and cleans the rust completely, leaving a smooth, slippery surface. The aluminum apparently reacts slightly with the metal making it clean easier. I have tried this on some very rusty equipment and it worked wonderfully. It obviously won't remove any deep pits of rust but does smooth them over. I used to use fine steel wool and WD40 to remove rust however, now I am an aluminum foil convert.

Threading heddles and reed on your loom: Drape a white (or light coloured) sheet over the back beam of your loom. This creates a light solid background, making it easier to see the heddle eyes/reed dents. Shining a little extra light onto the sheet will also help you see what you are doing much better.

Wax your shuttles: Recently I was using some beeswax on my loom and had a huge clump leftover. I rubbed it onto the bottom of my shuttles, then buffed them with a dry rag. What a difference... my shuttles fly through the shed now!

Did you know?

• Did you know that the Studio has a well-equipped kitchen? There is one-cup coffee machine and you may purchase a cup for 75 cents. There are dinner plates, cutlery, bowls, glasses, mugs and more! So, if you're running late or coming for the day, bring your meal and heat it in the microwave. Just wash up and it's all set for the next person. It's your studio – use it!

• The Ottawa Valley Weavers' and Spinners' Guild is incorporated under the Canada Not For Profit Corporations Act. Under the Act we have certain responsibilities. These include, accurate recording of decisions made by the Board and Members. When there is a change in members of the Board Industry Canada and the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) must be notified. As well, we must hold an Annual General Meeting each year.

• Currently a few of the Executive are working on completing the guild's application for Charitable status. The application goes to the Canada Revenue Agency – CRA. With Charitable status we can provide donation receipts for cash or equipment received. As a charity we can also recoup some of the taxes we pay when we purchase goods.

• The OVWSG is one of the largest guilds in Ontario – if not Canada - with over 140 members at this time! Our library collection is amazing, covering a wide range of topics in a number of formats – hardcover and softcover books, magazines, DVDs. And OVWSG houses the Ontario Handweavers' and Spinners' (OHS) Master's level projects. There is so much valuable information at our fingertips!



• Chair welcomed all and **new members** and any guests.

Business:

- Introduce the executive.

- Kelly went over the <u>Accessibility Policy</u>, that was created in 2012, outlining importance of awareness and sensitivity for disabilities. Some members have walkers or canes and hearing loss. Personal space of people includes the walkers and canes.
- Offer your arm rather than taking someone's arm, if person is visually impaired.
- Allow people with hearing loss to sit near the front, in well lit areas or in quieter areas.
- Be patient, clear and use plain language with people with learning disabilities.
- For people with mental issues, if they are in distress, ask what you can do to help them.
- Do not touch or distract service animals while they are working.
- Assisted devices in our building include elevator and ramps.
- If a support person is needed for a workshop, no fees will be charged for them. If not needed, ½ fees will be charged to support person to participate in workshop.

• Annie Jackson was thanked for her long standing work with the website. Judy Kavanagh will be taking it over shortly.

• Bernadette announced that the next Fibre Network will be next Monday, Jan.20th.
