Meet the Studio and Storerooms

As the attached diagrams show, the OVWSG now has three spaces in Heartwood House: a Studio and two storerooms. The Studio contains our Library, workshop area, office, and the Guild's floor looms. The Studio is a learning and meeting space. In addition to the Library and the mobile tables, it has a kitchen and an office area with a telephone for emergency calls and to buzz members into Heartwood House on evenings and weekends when the main office is closed. It also has floor looms that every member can register to use for their own projects.

The first storeroom is the OHS/Demo storeroom. It is located a short distance away from the Studio, on the other side of the Gallery/Unitarian Lobby. In an 8-foot square room, the Guild keeps the original Ontario Handweavers and Spinners (OHS) Independent Studies that are written to fulfill the OHS Master Weaver and Master Spinner programs. An OHS study is equivalent to a thesis that a graduate student would write to get an advanced degree from a University. Laurie Harkin-Chiasson is the guardian of these studies. Also in this storeroom are the materials and equipment that the Guild uses when demonstrating weaving, spinning and related fibre arts to the public. Supplies for the November Exhibition and Sale are also stored here.

The second storeroom is the Equipment storeroom. Located at the end of the east-west hall, most of the Guild's equipment (other than floor looms) is stored in this 100-square-foot room. Sturdy tables support the spinning wheels, warping mills, warping boards and teaching looms. Shelves and wire drawers hold other equipment and supplies. The fibre cart and the dye cart are located here as are the extra reeds and the parts of the 100-inch loom. A repair centre has been set up to the left of the door so members can service and repair equipment away from the activities in the Studio. One table is used by the Librarians to process acquisitions in a secure and peaceful environment.

Come to the meeting on March 3rd and check it out!

At the February monthly meeting, I displayed two projects during Show and Tell. The first was a pink shadow weave shawl woven with yarn that was 70% baby alpaca, 20% silk and 10% cashmere and was approximately 2,000 yards per pound. I found the pattern in the November/December 2006 issue of Handwoven. I used 15 epi.

The second project was a shadow weave bag in black and ivory 4/8 cotton also at 15 epi. The pattern can be found in Best of Handwoven Technique Series – Shadow Weave.

I was surprised when I realized they were the same threading. The difference was the tie up and, therefore, the treadling.

I have used the second pattern several times. It was fun using this draft to do a colour study. I used two shades of blue cotton for the warp and then used totally different colours in the weft to make three very different looking bags. I have also used this pattern to make a baby blanket and a sofa throw.

Now I have a project in my stash to put on the members' table at the November Exhibition and Sale. What about you? Now is a good time to start doing some items to add to the members' sale table. Yes, we are already planning for it and hoping to get lots of members contributing again this fall.

From Bernadette Quade: Making a blending board

This year a blending board became my must have tool, and as usual, money was an object. A search of my house turned up just about every little thing needed to make one, except the blending cloth. A quick call to Shuttleworks had a square foot of material speeding my way. Once the fabric arrived the project started with removing three extra rows of staples along the cut edges of the cloth.

After checking out the cost of marginally decent cutting boards I remembered a self acquired at a garage sale that had been pouting in my basement. It only needed to be cut to size, sanded and finished with leftover oil from when my drum carder was refurbishing. I needed to buy a can of contact cement but that will be used at work, so I might get reimbursed.

The board was measured for cutting and scored for cloth placement. Since the board was already finished I saved time not redoing it.

A warm winter day let the sawing and sanding be done outside. Jim Turner helped with clamping and sawing and any number of other things that I don't want to give him credit for.

Rough edges were smoothed down and the board taken inside to warm up for application of contact cement. This is a choice I made to add strength to the adhesion of the fabric to the board; staples or tacks may not hold well enough. If I need to add staples later, that's what I'll do, but I like the look of a

smooth board.

Contact cement needs to be respected. Do not disregard the instructions or you will ruin the fabric and the board with no hope of repair. I masked the edges and brushed on the contact cement.

After letting the cement dry as specified on the instructions I laid parchment paper over the board and placed the fabric on top for positioning. Some people use a series of chopsticks, knitting needles or wooden dowels, anything to keep the two surfaces from touching. If the surfaces touch they will bond immediately and will not come unglued, no matter what. Getting the two surfaces in the correct position is crucial. You want to be sure the cloth is laying in the right direction, teeth point to the top of the board.

Once the individual surfaces are 'dry' you can touch them without any problem and I recommend you give it a try. They feel slightly rubbery, and non-skid.

I laid out two sheets of parchment paper (you can use wax paper too) on the board surface, one closer to the top than the other, then positioned the blending cloth on top of the paper, and matched up its position along the scored lines. Hold the cloth in position. If you don't have a helper use a slightly weighted object.



Lift the cloth at the short paper end; remove the paper and keep the cloth up, check for position, bring in the two corners to make a slight "U" shape. Slowly place the middle of the "U" in the mid point of the board. Press this center point into place, align along the top edge and press the rest into place.

Slowly slide the rest of the paper out, pressing the cloth down as you go. Unfortunately there are no pictures of this process because we ran out of hands. I used the letter opener/staple puller to push down between the rows on the fabric to be certain the glue was adhering.

I used the gun stock finish I had on hand to finish up the edges of the board and the dowels (not shown). I didn't install a keel for lap blending because I don't have a lap. I might add a handle at a later date if my mood suits, but for now I like the minimalistic look.

Smile happily at the result.

General Membership Meeting 3 Feb 2014

Chair: President Kelly MacGregor

Chair welcomed all and new members and any guests.

Business:

Introduce the executive.

Program:

Introduction of speaker by Denise F.: Michael Rikley-Lancaster, the Executive-Director of Mississippi Valley Textile Museum in Almonte, spoke about the programs and restoration of the Mississippi Valley Rosamond Woolen Company Mill's original office and warehouse. (The original mill had been renovated into condominiums before National Historic Sites took over the other properties.) At one time there were six mills in the community. The Rosamond Mill made mainly fine worsted wool textiles for pants and suits for men. Original examples of these textiles are in the museum, having been found in a sample book stored in the rafters.

- Major renovations have been accomplished. A multi-purpose room on the 2nd floor is now being used for art and education workshops, meetings and exhibits. It can be rented out for \$25.00 an hour and has sinks, desks and tables. New lighting has also been added to the exterior entrances and emergency exits of the building, in traditional style of the period. Painting has been completed on the north side of the original warehouse eaves, having returned them to the 1871 original colours. Updated heating and air conditioning have been added.
- Museum policies have been updated to provincial standards.
- The "Memory Project" is an audio-visual record of stories from former millworkers. The mill having closed in the 1980's, many workers are still around and 40 interviews have been done to date.
- Funds are being secured for an elevator for the building.
- The Museum is developing textile-related Science and Technology curricula for Grades 2-4 and Grade 8 students, (Water-power, mills, industry) in conjunction with the Diefenbunker Centre in Carp.
- There is a current issue in that a power company wants to build on the old mill site. This discussion is on-going.
- 2013 FibreFest was a great success. There were 61 vendors / exhibitors and 1,728 paid visitors. It raised \$13,000.
- Exhibits recently have been "Hairlines", a study of hair in art, by Karen Jordan and Norman Takeuchi; "Transitions", quilted pieces, by Sharon Collins, Barbara Carroll, Ann Dunlap, Carolyn Gibbs and Jo-Anne Zorzi; "150 Years of Canadian Weddings" with pictures and actual dresses right up to present dresses by Pakenham's Patty Mann; "Rare Reflections" by Hilary Rice; "Combinations, Crinolines and Clotheslines", of paintings by Almonte's Jill McCubbin; "Inner Vision", flat loom woven tapestries by Mexican Maximo Laura; "Coptic Dancers", a display of Coptic tunics by US collector Dirk Holger; "Life and Legacy in Textiles of Martha Moenig", a textile designer from Almonte, who designed intricate lace on transparencies; "Almonte Mills at War"; "Unravelling Tension", knitted sculptures by Bozica Radjenovic, using reds, blues and yellows. Presently there is an exhibit by Andrea Graham and Maggie Glossop, on "Taking Felt in a New Direction", looking at seeds, growth and life.

- <u>Future plans</u> are to recreate the financial office of the Rosamond Woolen Company. Funds are still needed to have the interior plaster walls preserved as is. Some tract lighting is still needed in the left side of the gallery. A new gift shop, "Bobbins" is to be installed that visitors will walk through to get to the gallery. Warehouse doors need to be replaced, as well as the roof. A new sprinkler system is needed.
- <u>Future Exhibits</u> A collaboration of local weavers Jean Down, Pattie Dolan and Roberta Murrant is happening in 2014. 30:30 Rieiko Sudo's Designs for Nuno, a look of 30 years of exquisite weaving with pleats and translucent gulls, stitched work by Judy Dougherty and Michelle Provost. In 2015, "Rug Hooking" by Lesli Zanetti and Loretta Moore; "Retrospective of William Hodge School of Art" on jewellery, textiles, and bead portraits; the Kingston Fibre Artists; "Belated" by Carl Stewart, a weaving artist; and "Surfaces" by Robin Laws-Field and Diane Laundry, on weaving with photos in them.

In 2016, "Journey through Loss" by Johnnene Maddison; "Verdigris and Threads" by Fran Solar and **Say Johnson**; "Walking with our Sisters", embroidered work about lost aboriginal women; "Waterfalls", by Gayle Kells of Ottawa, using found objects; and the Ottawa Mixed Media Artists, displaying textiles, photos and paintings.

In 2017, it will be Canada's 150th birthday and Rosamond Mill's 150th as well. Michael is hoping for some spectacular exhibits then.

Michael was thanked after questions.

Break: 15 minute refreshment break.

Business:

- For the Raffle, would like spinners to come forward to administer the project. Idea of a "Sheep to Shawl" project over the weekend of the Ex and Sale discussed to advertise some of the guild's craft. The finished shawl could be used as the second prize in Raffle. The first prize would be a project (blanket or throw) on the 100" loom. Carlene Paquette volunteered to take on the Raffle project, to organize prizes, tickets, etc. Third prize has yet to be determined.
- All Minutes are filed for membership to see, as well as budget reports.
- Julie Anne Zdunich and Mary Morrison are on the nomination committee and are contacting people to see if they want to stay in their present position.
- Help needed by Denise F. with speakers for program, and someone for fundraising.
- In the studio, the large storeroom should be completed in a month. The Eco group will be with us until Feb. 14th. Open Studio is Fridays 11-3 pm with a pot-luck lunch. There is thoughts of having the 100" loom in the gallery foyer for the summer.
- "Meet the Wheels" program will be on Sat., Feb 15th, at 10 am. There was a request to have "Meet the Looms" at a later date.
- Heartwood House Regulations will be posted in the studio. (Please don't park during the day in the back parking lot, as H.H. people pay per the month for use of it.)
- Elizabeth W. will put a "how to use and clean" tutorial on the new carder. It is to be used only for fine fleece.
- Bernadette Q. will send monthly email blasts to guild members from Ontario Handweavers and Spinners. Speciality Study Groups and workshops are coming in the emails.
- Next Monday is the Fibre Networking group at the studio at 7 pm. Lori Rowsell was thanked for hosting a great "Spin-In" on Jan. 26th. She is hosting another one on Feb.23rd.


Budget:

- Kathleen S. explained that membership must be informed regularly of budget in a Corporation. There is a hope to end the year with a surplus of \$6000. There is still some money from the move yet to be spent. However the storage renovation has not been paid yet.
- At the Ex and Sale, we got some new members and participants for workshops. Guild will cover 3 tables and a demo area next year.
