
General Announcements

Changes to Parking at Heartwood House

With luck, by the time of our next meeting on October 5th, the parking lot at Heartwood House will have been redesigned to add 7 more spaces. The plan is to remove most of the fence between the parking lot and the alley that Heartwood House shares with the townhouses behind. Removing the fence means that 14 spaces can be put where the parallel parking is now. But the new spaces (and the 9 spaces along the west fence) will be accessible only through the alley that Heartwood shares with the Townhouses.

In essence, there will be two parking lots:

- An east lot with 10 spaces accessed through the entrance immediately behind the building. This lot dead-ends at space 10; and
- A west lot with 23 spaces accessed through the shared alley.

Labeling Goods for the Ex and Sale

Consumer protection laws require that all textile goods for sale in Canada be labeled, either permanently or temporarily, with their fibre content and the identity of the vendor. Care instructions are voluntary, but, as noted below, should be included for your own protection.

Permanent or temporary label:

Most vendors at the Ex and Sale are selling textiles that only need temporary labels. These include vendors of: carpets, batting, detachable collars and cuffs, headwear, napkins, placemats, piece goods and narrow fabrics, runners, scarves, table cloths, tea-towels, and yarns. For a full list see Appendix D to the *Guide to Textile Labelling and Advertising Regulations* (hereafter the "Guide") http://www.competitionbureau.gc.ca/eic/site/cb-bc.nsf/eng/01249.html#Alternatives

This means that the vendor only needs to pin a temporary label to the textile. Most use a business card that identifies then vendor and displays on the back:

- The fibre content where 5% or more of a fibre is present in the textile; and
- The care instructions.

Some members specify the fibre content on stick-on labels that can be individualized to each textile. Others create a list of the fibres that they use and write the percentage beside the name of the fibre. See examples below.

However, vendors of textiles like tailored or knitted clothing and throws or blankets need to attach "permanent" labels -- sewn-in labels that can survive 10 washings or cleanings. See Appendix C of the Guide for a full list. Normally these are commercially printed labels. But if the textile falls into the exception for "Home-crafted Articles", labels that are hand-written using india ink can be used: See section IX 3. of the Guide.

Fibre content:

The law requires that the fibre content be stated **generically** using only the words specified in the regulations. For the correct words to describe various fibres in both official languages, see Appendix A (Natural Fibres) and B (Man-made Fibres) of the Guide.

Vendor Identity:


Vendor identity is required to enable purchasers to contact vendors with complaints and for Industry Canada to enforce regulations. The vendor is the person by or for whom the textile was manufactured. A name and mailing address or electronic address is necessary. A vendor can also register with Industry Canada and be issued a CA Number to use as their identity on their products. Most commercial enterprises use this form of identity.

Care instructions:

Care instructions are voluntary but useful to the vendor. If the vendor specifies "dry clean only" and the purchaser shrinks a textile by washing it in hot water, then the purchaser cannot complain about the shrinkage.

Historical Note:

Proper labeling is important to prevent fraud and to protect buyers from their own actions. Textile labeling and other consumer protection laws result from a hard-fought battle by the women's movement in the 1950s, 1960s and 1970s. They have halted the sale of many substandard products and, more importantly, have saved lives. For example, have you ever wondered why your children's pajamas are knitted and close fitting? Or why there are no children's flannelette nightgowns on the market? Or why it is dangerous to allow your child to wear a loose adult-sized T-shirt to sleep or play in? Flammability! Cotton fabrics and open flames are lethal in the presence of air. Before the prohibition against children's flannelette nightgowns was enacted in the 1990s, an average of 7 children died each year in Canada when a candle ignited their nightgowns or a spark from a fireplace and the oxygen under the billowing fabric fed the flame. Tight pajamas minimize the oxygen available should the child be exposed to fire. That change came from lobbying by consumer groups bolstered by recommendations by fire officials.

- Chair welcomed all old and new members and any guests in attendance.
- Executive was introduced.
- Heartwood Exec. Director, Moe, has asked that every visitor sign in when they enter front foyer and has asked that we do a head count at every General Meeting. (69 present tonight.)
- <u>Financials</u> Funding from the City \$17,000 for an operating grant. The auction in June raised about \$2000. Membership is down a bit (almost 200) from last year but it is still increasing.
- <u>Studio</u> the wall from upstairs classroom has been removed and it is much brighter and better circulation.
- The Open studio is off the calendar, since members do not go every Tuesday and Friday, consistently and some members might expect people to be there.
- The locks have been rekeyed and one will need a lockbox code to access the doors. Just contact one of the Executive for the code.
- Raffle Tickets revenue for keeping workshop fees lower. Pictures of the prizes on the guild website and Facebook.
- Workshops 2015-16 schedule almost ready.
- Ex & Sale booths are all taken. Volunteers will be needed. Ads this year will be bigger and targeted. Episode on Rogers TV during weekday. Hopefully 6 weeks before the Sale, pictures will be up on Facebook Event Page of some of the products for sale.
- The Co-op table has room for more vendors. 10% commission will go to guild. Will need help with the booth.
- <u>Jury Committee</u> For example weaving, work will be looked at to see that there are no weaving or sleying errors. Jurors will hopefully assist people in improving their work. Labelling and pricing also very important. One can choose to sell or not. Jury criteria is on guild website.
- <u>Operational Positions</u> President thanked all the Operations volunteers for their hard work. People around the room talked about what they were involved in with the guild.
- <u>International Plowing Match</u> Finch, ON, on Sept. 22-26. Gord Moat will be going to demonstrate the Great Wheel spinning and the warping mill.
- <u>Newsletter</u> members are encouraged to put ads and pictures in the newsletter for free, to advertise items for sale or exhibitions.
- Rosepath Auction need a coordinator for the auction that is in December.

OVWSG Policy and Procedures

Reservation and Use of Studio Looms

Policy

OVWSG members may use any of the floor looms that are kept for this use in the Guild's Studio at Heartwood House. Anyone wishing to weave on a Studio loom must:

- Be a paid-up member
- Have completed a beginning weaving course or have equivalent weaving experience
- Take responsibility for the loom's respectful use, and
- Commit to observe the procedures stated below.

The rental of Studio looms is free of charge

Procedures

Reservation

All requests for the use of a loom in the OVEWSG Studio must be sent to the Studio Manager's inbox at studio@ovwsg.com at least 2 weeks before the intended use.

Studio Managers will advise the member that the requested loom has been reserved and state the end date of the rental period.

Rental period

Looms may be rented for up to three (3) months to ensure that all members have equal access to this equipment.

If a renter finishes the project(s) prior to the 3 months deadline the Studio Managers must be informed so that the next person in line for the loom can be contacted.

Renters will be contacted by the Studio Managers one (1) week before the due date to remind them that the warp must be removed.

Any warps still on the loom after the 3 months deadline has past will be cut off.

Extensions to continue with the use of the loom will be assessed on a month to month basis and approved if no other member requested the use of the specific loom.

Problems and Damage to Loom
Any problems or damages to the loom must be reported to the Studio Managers as well as to the Equipment Manager (equipment@ovwsg.com) as soon as possible to ensure that repairs to the loom can be done in a timely manner.
Unauthorized Use of Loom
Warps put on a loom without prior reservation will be removed by the Studio Managers at their discretion.
