
General Announcements

Volunteers needed: Heartwood House Fundraiser and Bake Sale -- December 3rd

On the evening of Thursday, **December 3rd, 2015**, Heartwood House -- where we have our Studio and Classroom -- is holding a **Concert, Fundraiser and Bake Sale**. The concert starts at 7:30 PM. Tickets are \$20.

The Ottawa Police Choir will sing, a silent auction will offer interesting items (Restaurant vouchers, VIA rail gift vouchers, event tickets, movie tickets, quality Christmas decorations, exotic candles ...) and the OVWSG will coordinate a bake sale of goodies provided by all 19 charities housed in Heartwood House. The proceeds will go to the upkeep and improvement of HH.

Heartwood House is a charity that has pioneered housing other small charities and non-profit organizations at 30% below market rates. Announcements from guild coordinators

Studio

As we head into a busy networking and workshop season, we would like to remind guild members that the studio is a shared community space. Please make an effort to tidy up after yourself before you depart. Trash and recycling are picked up by Heartwood House staff on weekdays at 3 pm from the hall outside the studio door. Please do not leave food waste under the sink as it may not be picked up for several days and doing so invites odours and pests to take up residence. It would be appreciated if each person washes whatever dishes they might use. Any tools are to be put away - the cabinet doors are labelled to help you with this. The floor should be swept. The rule of thumb is that all users should endeavour to leave the space cleaner than when they arrived. Likewise, this applies to anyone using the classroom. Make your guild spaces a pleasure for all to use!

The sign-in log is located on the clipboard next to the printer. We have noticed that not everyone is signing in when they use the studio. Tracking our use of the studio is important in obtaining funding, so it would really help if everyone makes a point of taking a few moments to write their name in the log. Thanks!

As we head into the winter months, guild members should bring along a pair of shoes for indoor wear and remove their boots before entering the studio, classroom, or the meeting room. Thanks for your consideration.

Library

Since we have lots of new members, let's have a quick review of the Guild library.

Where is it? In the studio space at 400 McArthur Ave. The books, DVDs and reference are in the shorter cabinets on one wall and the magazines are on the other wall.

When is it open? On the Monday of the meeting, I open the library at 5pm and we shut down the library at 7:15pm so that the Librarians get to enjoy the meeting too.

Who can use the library? Any member in good standing (no overdue library material) may take out up to 4 items, i.e. 1 book, 2 magazines and a DVD. If you are not a member you can browse the collection but cannot take anything out.

How do I sign out library materials? Look inside the back of books and magazines and inside the boxes of DVDs and you will find a pocket containing a library card. You have to know the month and year of the next meeting (this month is hard because the correct answer will be Jan 2016 or 01/16 will work too). Next you need to print your own name and phone number. If you forget this we may not be able to help you! Now hand the card to the librarian in charge of books going out. They will give you a slip of paper to put in the pocket with our contact information and a reminder of the date due.

What should I do if I can't attend the next meeting to return my items? The due date slip in the pocket at the back of the book has our email address so you can contact us. We can renew your item for a month or if it has been requested by another member we can arrange to have it returned.

How do I return items I took out last month? There will be a sign on the table with the New Acquisitions display that says book Returns. One of the Librarians (usually Terry) will ask for your name and they will record your items. If you have overdue items the "new book acquisition fund" (library fine) is \$1.50 per item per month. So remember to let us know if you can't make a meeting!! If you are dropping off items in the book return box which is located on the low white shelves by the double doors, please email the librarians so we know it's there. If you see something in the box, please leave it there, as someone has just returned it. It will be available at the next meeting after having been recorded as returned.

Why should I come in early to view the library? Because we have a phenomenal collection and I think we may have more books, DVD's and Magazines than the Burlington Guild (my library friendly rival!!). If you come early it is not as busy and you will have more time to select your last minute mass inspirational reading or viewing!!

Remember if you have any questions you can ask any of the Librarians for help.

If you take out one of the new items please do a little write up for the guild newsletter. Did you like it? Was it helpful? What was it about? (Really briefly). Let the rest of the guild know if it's something they might enjoy too.

We hope to see you between 5pm and 7:15pm the Monday of the meeting!

- Simone Poullilian, who had lived in Mongolia as a biologist, brought baby camel fibre to sell. He is hoping to set up a fibre co-operative for it, under the company "Can Dalay Baikhal".

PROGRAM:

Susan Berlin, who helped start "Fibre Roads," talked about the beginnings of it. About three years ago, they were finding that many local yarns shops had closed, yet there were many fibre farms in the area with processed fibres. Fibre Roads was started to promote the local fibre industry. There are nine members and it is growing. Fibre Shed in California is a great example of a really huge network.

Susan brought along some of the fibres from the network, such as very soft Grade 1 baby alpaca, from Serendipity Farms. (It is sent to Wellington Fibres to process.) She also had kid mohair from Vankleek Hill, that had the waxy coating pre-washed out and a Romney sheep cross fibre.
