Library

As a **member in good standing** you can sign out **up to 4** items form the guild library. We have books, magazines and **DVDs that are only viewable on a computer**.

To sign out library material, make you selection (up to 4) and go to the librarian with the outgoing book sign. Look in the back for the card pocket and take out the card. As neatly as you can print next month's date (Mar.2016 or 03/2016). You also need to print your name and phone number. Give the librarian both your filled in card and the date due reminder slip and she will stamp and return the reminder slip to you.

You are responsible to bring the library materials back in good condition before the start of the next meeting or you will have the opportunity to donate to the new book fund. **The overdue fine is \$1.50 per item per month** overdue.

To return library material take them to the librarian with the **Book Return** sign. She will ask you your first name and find the cards to go with your incoming items. She will also have candy to share for bringing the items back!

If you cannot make it the meeting, email the librarians and we will renew your items to the next month or arrange a time for you to drop them off.

I know that the new system is a bit more complicated but we have had less missing or late books since we have started working this way!

The Executive would like to expand the time the library is available in daylight hours. We are presently open before the meetings at 5pm and at the socials but neither is really during the daylight. The workshop cancellation policy has been updated. As of now, workshops with fewer than 4 students 2 weeks before their running date will have to be cancelled. This is for two reasons: first, most workshops do not break even with 4 member students since we now include HST in the price and second, classes with fewer than 4 appear to lack a certain level of interaction between students which we have found to be very beneficial to learning.

That said, I really don't like cancelling workshops and I find it especially frustrating to receive that last registration I needed 2 days after I cancel so please register sooner rather than later.

Lastly, *Just Beyond Beginners*, which was scheduled to start Jan 30th, has run into our cancellation policy. It has 3 people signed up and needs one more to run. If anyone has been thinking of this workshop now is the time as I have 3 rather disappointed new weavers at the moment. At this point I will likely need to juggle dates to start it later, but hopefully, if there is more interest we can adjust things to suit everyone.

Membership

Membership renewal dates:

For new members – the renewal date will be 1 year from when you joined, specifically, the last day of that month. For example, a new member who joins Jan. 4 or Jan 24, both would have a renewal date of Jan 31, of the following year.

For existing members

This year only - If you renew before Apr. 30 (existing renewal date for everyone) then your new renewal date would be Feb. or Mar. of 2017. Otherwise, it would be April 30, 2017 After this transition year – your renewal date now remains constant, as that same month every year.

Grace period: 30 days from the last day of your renewal month. After that, all guild privileges will be revoked until renewal payment is received.

Late payment: Renewal month remains the same. Only difference is that privileges get re-instated upon payment.

Loom donations for Kenyan spinning and weaving workshop

If you have a loom that is gathering dust, or hear of one that needs a good home, you can contribute directly to the sustainable livelihood of an African craftsperson.

As part of its "World of Craft" project, the Ontario Craft Council and Fleming College are collecting looms for Nanyuki Spinners and Weavers, a women's self-help project in Kenya, East Africa. You can see their work online and learn about the workshop at www.nanyukispinnersandweavers.org. The project is run and managed by women who have no safety net other than what they create for themselves.

John Arnold, a Director of the Ontario Craft Council, is organizing collection and shipment of the looms to Kenya and is arranging for tax receipts for donations. He is also working to create a market for products from the workshop beyond the transient tourist trade.



January 2016 Meeting Minutes

General Membership Meeting 4 January 2016

Chair: Mandy Heggtveit

- Chair welcomed all old and new members and any guests in attendance. (About 50 members in attendance.)
- Executive was introduced.

Announcements:

- Mandy thanked all the writers of reports, getting them in on time, for the City report. When looking through them, it made Mandy aware of just how much we have achieved throughout this year. We have taken a classroom wall down, had numerous workshops and additional workshops "by request", a successful Ex & Sale, and interesting presentations and Show and Tells.
- Merilyn Mulligan announced that the Russell Agricultural Fair will have some guild members selling there. It is to be held in Russell on January 16th.
- Elizabeth Watt mentioned that there were some spots left in a few workshops, like Beyond Beginning Weaving, Beginning Inkle, Rigid heddle and Pine Needle Basket Workshop.
- Jan Scott mentioned that the DVDs from the library are meant to be viewed on computers only.

Presentation:

Mandy introduced Carl Stewart, a member of our guild and Ottawa textile artist and weaver. Carl graduated from Holland College School of Visual Arts in PEI and is a recipient of various Art Grants. He has exhibited his work at the Canadian Textile Museum in Toronto, Mississippi Valley Textile Museum, at the City of Ottawa and other galleries in Ontario.

Carl sees a presentation "like a performance" and began his by singing a bit. Displayed titles led us to further textile artworks and explanations. "Fruit and Fibre" - "It's what I am, it's what I do," "Swoon" –homoerotic images woven into textiles, and a most emotional and moving visual display, "Belated", a homage to his deceased brother Owen, who was killed at age 3, in front of a 5-year old Carl. Colourful, Warhol-like images, as well as a delicate (1300 stitches / sq. inch!) cross-stitch series fading to almost invisible work, all dyed with the soil from the PEI family farm and a series of laid-in design thread (Dukagang) portraits as well, all done with exquisite craftsmanship and artistry. Carl's "Nice Shoes, Faggot" is an 80-foot tapestry created to commemorate a waiter murdered in a hate crime. Fabric is "right next to our skin and it makes it unique. We are in contact with it from the day we are born, to the day we die." The final work that Carl showed was the Clò mòr or "great cloth" project that he is presently working on. Inspired by the flag colours and designs of 75 homophobic governments, Carl has woven gorgeous plaid fabrics for each of these countries where homosexuality is considered a crime.

Sprinkling humour in with the sometimes heavy, emotional content, Carl presented a deeply moving display of creative, thought-provoking and very talented textile artwork.
