### This Month's Program

In December we will hold again our ever so popular yearly **Rosepath Auction**, one of the Guild's most important fundraisers and great all around fun. Everyone is encouraged (but not required) to contribute items they no longer require that someone else might need. This includes just about anything from fibre and yarns, to tools, equipment, books (including novels), household items, gifts, etc. Please bring your items to the December meeting by 7:15.

After more years than anyone can remember, we are raising the price of Rosepath numbered bidding envelopes from \$2 to \$3. There will still be the generous 50 bidding tickets in each of them, but we are just trying to catch up with the times!

How it works: members may buy one or more envelopes of 50 tickets bearing the same number as the envelope. These are all yours to place in whichever margarine container is located near the item you wish to bid on. After all the tickets are distributed, a designated person will draw a number from the container. The person who has the envelope number that matches the number drawn wins the item. Please do not move the margarine containers.

### Next Month's Program

### Katherine Kelland: 1918-2016

President Ruth Cooper's message in the November issue of the newsletter about mentoring brought back memories of one of my mentors, Katherine Kelland, an early Guild member who passed away in August of this year. Ruth's article reminded me of my own experience as a beginner in 1970. We had mini workshops on Saturday mornings when our experienced members demonstrated the art of warping, dressing the loom, weaving plain weave, twill and rosepath. Those sessions were important to connect with fellow weavers to learn their special tips, which I still follow today. Katherine was one of those mentors. Her obituary lists her as a "famous weaver" but we knew her as a lady who loved to sample. Katherine was also very generous in giving away her looms to those in our Guild who needed them.

Ruth's encouraging of mentoring brings forward an important tradition of the Guild. I hope that there are others who still remember Katherine and the many mentors who guided us in those early years of learning. (Katherine's obituary appeared in the Vancouver Sun and Ottawa Citizen in early September)

### Workshops

Jan and I spent October putting the 2017 Workshop Schedule together. I couldn't do it without Jan. Only she can keep me sitting at the table for 5 hours straight to make sure the job gets done, and then she turns that list of dates and workshops into the most stunning catalogue! Judy has now transferred all the information to the website, but the catalogue is worth downloading just to turn the pages and be inspired. Please take the time to look at it soon and start registering, there are lots of new workshops, some new instructors and new areas to explore.

Some changes to note for 2017: unfortunately, we are the victims of our own success and the Guild has had to pay HST on workshop fees for some time now. This year prices had to go up slightly (\$5 per workshop day) to ensure that all workshops break even with 4 member registrations. We also have changed the payment and cancellation policies. Workshop payments will be due no less than 8 weeks before they start. The treasurer will cash all cheques received at that time. Cancellations between 2 and 8 weeks before the workshop start will be refunded 75% of the registration fee. No refunds less than 2 weeks before the start date. If we have insufficient <u>paid</u> registration (i.e. fewer than 4 students) 2 weeks before a workshop starts it will be cancelled and there will be a full refund to anyone registered.

#### Colour Unboxed by Out of the Box

December 20, 2016- February 25, 2017 Mississippi Valley Textile Museum Vernissage: Saturday, January 14, 2017

The 12x12 colour challenge pieces will all be hung, which might be an inspiration for OVWSG guild members. OOTB has also produced a book on the colour challenge.

### Classes

Learning to weave on a Rigid Heddle Loom - December 3, 2016 @ Carriageway Studios, Almonte. Contact <u>latelierweavingstudio@gmail.com</u> 613-882-6893

#### Learn to weave and play with copper wire in February!

This four-day class (Sat/Sun Feb 4, 5, 11 &12) covers the basics of weaving with copper wire. Students will create a variety of woven samples with which they can experiment. The class covers techniques for hammering and shaping, using green patina solutions, black patina, and heat. This class is flexible and can accommodate all levels of experience. Experimentation is encouraged. A brief intro to knitting with copper wire can be included.

#### Japanese Braiding (Kumihimo) Workshop

Sat. Jan. 14, 10 - 4pm, in the classroom. Use a traditional braiding stand (Marudai) and weighted warp bobbins (tama) to produce braids. We will be making samples of a Square braid, Flat braid with chevrons, Spiral braid with a Core and a Flat braid with 3 dimensional hearts. All equipment is supplied; just bring some scissors. Braids can be used for trim, straps, shoelaces, jewelry cords etc. History, warping, end uses, and using jewelry findings for finishing, will be covered.

#### Pine Needle Basketry Workshop

Sun. Jan. 29, 10 to 4 pm, in the studio. Using long pine needles we will make an oval basket, with swirling wheat stitch design. This is a coil structure of basket which means coils are sewn together using traditional stitches. This basket starts out round and then a technique of extensions transforms it into an oval basket. Note: There will not be enough time to completely finish your basket in the time allotted. However, at the point where we stop, you will have been taught all the techniques you need to continue at home, to finish your basket.

### **General Membership Meeting 7 Nov 2016**

#### Chair: Mandy Heggtveit

- Chair welcomed members, new members, and guests. (59 members in attendance, plus four new members).
- Executive was introduced.

#### **Business & Announcements:**

- **Workshops:** The new workshop catalogue is out! It should be up on the website in the next couple of weeks.
  - We've got new classes and there is a new rating system that identifies the workshop's required proficiency level, so be sure to check it out.
  - HST is now included in the prices that are listed.
  - Cancellation policies are in place now please read them carefully. Contact workshops@ovwsg.com if you have an urgent/compelling reason for cancelling a registration outside of the policy parameters.
  - Prolonging the Fun: ergonomics workshop is coming up and still has spaces. This workshop is highly recommended for those who would like to gain instruction for how to avoid injuries and strains while weaving/spinning/felting.
- Heartwood House Liaison: Marie-France Gosselin has volunteered Thank you!
- Guild Call for help: We still need another volunteer to join the equipment team.
- **Guild seeking:** any member or member's spouse who is a corporate lawyer who would be willing to help with a small audit question. Please contact Ruth Cooper.
- Ex & Sale: The sale went very well, thank you to our Ex & Sale Coordinator Carole Stewart!
- Ex & Sale Co-op Table: Quite successful! We were only \$50 less than at last year's show which spanned three days instead of two!
- Sheep to ShawI: Kelly MacGregor is the guild contact organizing this event.
  - So far we have almost enough people for two sheep to shawl (S2S) teams.
  - Kelly passed around the sign-up sheet again for those who didn't get a chance to sign up last month.
  - Woolgrowers @ Lambsdown are not having a competition this year, just a demo.
- **Grant Coordinator:** Kelly MacGregor is our new Grant Coordinator. She has printed out the forms and will be working on it.
- Fibre of Our Being Works of the OVWSG: 150 yrs 12"squares Gallery Show: Carlene Paquette is heading this event and needs more people to create submissions!
  - Anne McElroy offered some creative help for those who are wondering what to do for a submission. Basically, she had some pieces of felt she wasn't using so she places it on the canvas, covering the whole thing, and VOILA! Art!
  - $\circ$  \$10 covers the canvas and the hanging expenses.
  - Julie will be warping a Dorothy for spinners to weave on and show their work.

- The due date for submissions is the 2017 April 3 Meeting.
- **Q: Is the material being juried?** A: Yes, and that includes tips to ensure the submission makes it into the show.
- Q: How many canvases have gone out? A: Only about 10! Need more help!
- **Open Studio:** This is for everybody. You can come in by yourself simply ask the executive for the lockbox code or Shane at Heartwood House to let you in. There are usually lots of people in on Tuesdays & Fridays.
- Clarification from last meeting: "People should be sure to sign into the studio when the Heartwood House office is not open." PLEASE ALWAYS SIGN INTO THE STUDIO. Members should always sign in as it shows us the time usage of our rooms and helps us justify our grant money for City of Ottawa. The studio sign-in has no relation to the Heartwood House sign-in.
  - A member pointed out that it's redundant to sign into the front desk then, but they insist that people do so. *Mandy will follow-up to clarify.*
- Seguin Mechanized Loom 16 harnesses: This loom could be rented for four people to share the cost of approximately \$400/month and have 1 week each to use it.
  - Need to be familiar with Fibreworks weaving program for the design and to run the loom.

- Heartwood House Concert Bake Sale October 21: was a success! Thanks to those who helped! Liane Thiry-Smith, Alison James, Lee-Ann Scott, and Ann Sunahara.
- Heartwood House OC Transpo Lost & Found Sale: Thanks to Ann Sunahara and all who helped out!
- December 5 Guild Meeting:
  - Rosepath Auction: CALL FOR HELP Coordinator & auctioneer: Call was answered by Kathleen Schwass, Carl Stewart, Carmen Deschenes, and Sayward Johnson. Additional volunteers please talk to Kathleen Schwass.
  - Several items already gathered to auction: 2 large warping mills, 24" Dorothy Loom, antique skein winder, carder, many accessories (shuttles, temples, spindles, swifts, etc.)
  - Mandy explained what the Rosepath Auction is: Donate anything from around your house and bring it the night of the auction: books, mugs, equipment, furniture, etc. Buy some envelopes of auction tickets, then go around and bid on items you want. Once all the tickets are all sold, then the tickets are drawn.
  - Break: bring goodies to share. List ingredients for homemade items, please.
  - Mary Morrison: presentation of honorary life membership due to her dedication of many decades of support to our guild (since 1973), also the provincial OHS.
- Membership update: 12 new members in Oct. We're up around 200 members again.
- **100**" **Coverlet**: Ann Sunahara brought in the coverlet that her husband won from the raffle and laid it out for us to view it. She wanted us to know that it went to someone who knows the amount of work that went into it. He appreciates the work and design.

#### Program: Noble Fibre Mill Talk with Matt and Lori

The events of the program are transcribed as best as possible during this fast paced talk. I offer my sincerest apologies for any omissions and variations in wording.

#### Mandy welcomed and introduced our guests Mathew Nobles & Lori Bulmer to the membership

Matt began this talk by covering his reasons for getting into the fibre business. He described having a history and experience in the field as a child and youth with his grandparents and parents operating Belfast Mini-Mills Ltd (*B.M.M.Ltd.*). Matt was surrounded by and part of the industry as he grew up, but he didn't initially see this as his future and he went into masonry. Before long Matt found that doing masonry work hurts the back! Fibre is more fun <sup>(3)</sup>

Towards the present day, Matt and Lori have lived in the region for 6 years and had some animals. Their overall goal with their mill is to be an addition to the fibre culture here. They feel that they have a rich history in this area and Lanark where they live. They've seen many sides of the industry. An example of this is reflected in them having sourced some fibre from Nunavut which arrived as fresh hides and required them to work on them quickly. As they continue with the mill processes they're getting more and more into it.

Noble Fibre Mill is currently a very small operation based out of their double car garage and basement. They have about 12 machines including a needle felter and wet felter, and are looking to obtain some more for spinning. Currently they can produce rovings, felt, carded fibre, and can only produce core-spun yarns from their carder.

In terms of products Matt and Lori will focus on small amounts of unique products which they feel is their upper-hand over the big industry. For their production, they find that the more complex the blend or finer the fibre used raises the price as the machine must be adjusted and they must be more attentive throughout the process. Humidity is a huge factor for them in their current workspace. Merino is their workhorse fibre they use the most as they like to use it to make shorter fibres more spin-able.

~Several samples were passed around of their different roving, core-spun, and felt.

In addition to producing some small batches of their own creations, Noble Fibre Mill will do custom processing for people. They're expanding offerings as they become comfortable with production, and they're working towards having more to offer.

### Q/A/Comment

#### Q: Do you only process animal fibres?

A: No; bamboo, superwash, flax... putting it through in blends. There is a 6" maximum staple length when putting fibre into the machine; otherwise, it wraps around the 6" drums of said machine.

And for felt we have a wet felter, pre felt, needle felter, felting loom. *Matt described the machine's working.* 

Also, We only do really small batches and only accept orders from the local area. 2.5-3lb batches at least, wash it well – they'll likely have to wash it at the mill anyway. During the process you can lose upwards of 30%, so you can bring small amounts in but you'll have proportionally more loss through the process because of the minimums required to run the machine.

We also do blending.

We try to bring in unique products to avoid having a conflict of interest with other fibre vendors. We try not to come to shows with the same things that we've been processing for people. We really want to be complimentary to the fibre community.

#### Q: Do you produce alpaca batts?

A: Yes! We have lots: 200-300lbs of alpaca blends.

#### Q: Do you offer combed top or roving?

**A:** Roving. We do very good roving with well aligned fibres. We expect to get a machine in the next batch of 4 pieces of equipment that will make top, so probably within a year.

We're moving towards more spinning products.

We were also shocked at how quickly we were accepted into the community. Thought it would take some time. Who knew there were so many *fibreheads* out there!

#### Q: Do you do all your own cleaning and washing?

A: Fleeces must be skirted before they arrive. We have a 3 chamber 50 gallon centrifugal washing machine. Organic soap is in a huge tub beside it. Alpaca is the hardest to wash! You can't always tell if it's clean. It needs to be clean because it really gunks up the machines. We have dry racks, and the picker requires its own room. The fibre separator machine can get out guard hairs etc. Cashmere...it's a slow machine.

Maybe you can help me with something...I have lots of felt strips from cutoff... & I don't know what to do with it...

The guild audience became extremely excited! Members volunteered to supply ideas. **Q: Where are you located?** 

A: Between Almonte and Perth.

### Q: Do you offer tours?

A: We're hesitant because there isn't much space to move around since it's all set up in a house. There are liability concerns with the lack of space to move around.

Thank you to everyone. Most of our support has come from the guild. We want to have a full mill, a store, buy locally, and serve locally ©

Mandy thanked Matt and Lori and asked that they keep us up to date on how things are coming.
