Upcoming workshops by Nancy Ingram

I am planning on attending the March monthly Guild meeting (weather permitting) to show samples from each of my workshops that have been added to the Guild curriculum this year. The three needle felting workshops include one with an Easter theme (bunny, acorns, eggs and chicks), one with a Christmas theme (a snowman) and one which involves felting a tapestry in a flower design. The two tapestry courses are traditional tapestry and transparent tapestry. Both will include weaving a sampler that will explore design theory, and various techniques which participants will then use to design and weave their own tapestry.

By showing samples developed for the workshops and expanding upon the information on the workshop website, it is hoped that weavers and felters will be encouraged to participate in the workshops.

Announcements from Heartwood House

Parking at Heartwood House

Parking at Heartwood House (HH) is limited, especially during the winter months when larges piles of snow occupy several parking spots. Staff working for Heartwood House member organization pay for monthly parking passes to park in the parking lot behind the building. The parking situation for OVWSG members who have to park during working hours, especially on Tuesdays, has been a conundrum for some time now and in discussion with HH Executive Director Maureen Moloughney we agreed to the following:

- 1. Francesca Overend and Mandy Heggtveit as the most consistent attendants of Tuesday Open Studio days have HH parking passes with their license numbers. Should they not attend Open Studio their passes can be passed on to someone else
- 2. In addition HH offers the parking 2 spots in front of the Unitarian entrance for use by OVWSG members during the day
- 3. Anyone else must park on the street until 3:30 PM and may then move their car to the back since by then demands on the back parking lot will be greatly reduced
- 4. The two pass holders and anyone parking in front of the Unitarian entrance during the day must sign in at the reception in the parking registry and pay \$2.00 towards snow plowing and parking lot maintenance costs
- 5. Anyone attending events at HH after 3:30 PM and on week-ends may park in the back parking lot

The Executive asks that OVWSG members respect this arrangement and strongly suggests car sharing whenever possible.

Announcements from guild coordinators

Library

Please make Sure you return your books before the meeting.

Hours: Meeting Monday morning (check our Facebook page - usually 9am) to 7:15pm

We have the library open early on the meeting Monday, (often by 9am), so you will have lots of time to come in and check out the books. I will post on the OVWSG's Facebook page as soon as I have the library ready for you. If you come in early you can check out the local restaurants for dinner. Please come in early to check out the new library acquisitions and see what books are on display relevant to the meeting topic.

We close the library at **7:15pm** in hopes that the librarians may attend the meeting on time. Librarians are usually at the socials if space allows we can open the library if there is interest. For other times contact the librarians.

Who can use the library:

Members in good standing (membership not about to expire and no overdue items) can take out up to 4 library items which will be due the next meeting.

To take books out:

- 1. Select your book, DVD or Magazine and go to the librarian with the sine for "books going out".
- 2. You will find a card at the back of the item which will have to be filled out.
 - 1. You have to be able to print your own name and phone number on the "name" line
 - 2. And the "Date" will be the date of the next meeting. (April 2017 or 04/2017).
- 3. Give the card to the librarian with the "outgoing" sign and you will get a stamp on the reminder slip at the back of the book.

To Return Books:

The librarian with the "Incoming Books" sign will check off your returned books. **Please tell the librarian your first name** so the cards can be more quickly pulled. If your books are overdue your late fee is \$1.50 per item per month.

If you cannot make the next meeting (hot date, Alice Cooper Concert, bad weather) email library@ovwsg.com and we will renew your books for a month or arrange to get them from you. If you are in the studio you can drop them in the library return box, just let us know you have put them there!

Requesting a book:

You can request books from the library catalog, which is on our web site under author, title and subject. If the books are available, we will put them aside for you at the books going out table. You can contact the library through the guild library email. It is on the web site and on the slip of paper in the back of all the circulating library books.

Please treat all library materials with great care. We have an amazing resource and we want it to last a long time.

The librarians are working on reclassifying the collection. This is a massive undertaking and we will try to do the actual book moving as quickly as possible to decrease interruption of library use. When the great migration begins please be patient with us. We are optimistic this will make using the library easier for both the patrons and the librarians.

Canada's 150th Art Show Update

Our show, **The Fibre of Our Being,** will be on display at the Lalande + Doyle Exhibition Space at the Shenkman Arts Centre from May 9 - 28, 2017. We will be hosting a Finissage reception on Sunday May 28th between 1 pm and 3 pm.

The info I have been provided indicates that viewing hours will be Monday to Sunday: 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. However, selective viewing hours may be established as required.

Canvas Status:

As of February 14th a total of 102 canvases have been sold and picked up. This means we need 48 more canvases to fill in our show. Please consider making another canvas for the show.

Photographs of fibre-related stuff are also an applicable entry. If you have a favourite picture please dig it out, get it printed and mount it up. (I printed my 12x12" photograph at Costco and it was only \$6.50 which is very reasonable.) Another idea might be a collage using swatches and a design draft. I encourage you to pull out your tools and PLAY. Don't overthink things... just go with the flow and make up a square for the show.

If you need help mounting your work, please contact Carlene Paquette or Liane Thiry-Smith and we will try to help.

Advertising:

We are working on getting printed posters and postcard adverts. We will need your help to get these distributed throughout the city. It is my hope that we'll have them in hand for the March meeting. Please take some home with you and talk to some of the businesses in your neighborhood to get them to put up posters or put out postcards.

Pieces for Sale:

Artists can list their work for sale. However, please be advised that we are obligated to collect 15% of the pre-tax sale price and submit that money to the AOE Arts Council on the last day of the exhibit. This money will be deposited in the ARTicipate Endowment Fund. According to our agreement with the city we are responsible for collecting and remitting the commission and all applicable sales taxes.

We need a couple of volunteers to act as Sales Liaisons for the show. These people would field any inquiries to purchase, connecting buyers and artist sellers. The sales liaison may help collect the funds from buyers, tally/pay the commission, distribute money back to the sellers and assist with arranging for the work to get to the buyers. Ideally the sales liaisons are people who are experienced sellers.

Reception:

Our reception is on **Sunday May 28**th **from 1 to 3 pm**. Mark your calendars and please invite your friends and family. The more the merrier!

We will need to provide light snacks (baking, fruit/veggie/cheese trays, juice, etc.) We need someone to coordinate the reception and for members to volunteer to bring snacks.

- Executive was introduced with thanks for all their support and that of our committees and volunteers.
- A tour of the guild spaces was offered to take place during the break.

Business & Announcements:

- **Visitor:** Selling a spinning wheel+ and left a flyer to post in the studio.
- **Workshops:** There is space in most workshops from now onward.
 - o The catalogne workshop at the Mississippi Valley Textile Museum was such a success that our Ottawa guild is interested in having the instructor back to our OVWSG classroom to have another workshop. Those interested, please contact Ruth at: president@ovwsg.com
- **Networking/Demo:** The demo team indicated that the Scottish Diaspora Tapestry event at the Ottawa Public Library central branch went well.
 - o Bernadette would like to let everyone know that if you're contacted by anyone interested in the guild doing a demo, to send their contact info directly to demo@ovwsg.com.
- **Library:** Circulation data is on the PC now so you may notice the check-in/out process is faster. The update to the library catalogue is well underway now.
- The Fibre of our Being: Works of the Ottawa Valley Weavers and Spinners Guild 150 squares art project is underway. There are about 50 canvases remaining for purchase.

 - A reminder to all who are still trying to decide what to put on a canvas: it's meant to be 150 pieces of art related to fibre this is a really broad topic.
 - o The show is in May at the Shenkman Art Centre in Orleans and you may hand in your canvas anytime before the April meeting.

The meeting to discuss changes is Tuesday, Feb 7, 7 pm at Heartwood House. 2nd, 3rd, and 4th year University of Ottawa students are designing it. Anyone is welcome to give feedback and input at their meeting.
- OHS (Ontario Handweavers & Spinners) Conference "At the Fulcrum" May 5- 7. 2017 Seneca College, Finch Ave., Toronto. Featuring Merchant Mall, Workshops, Guild Challenge, Accommodation and networking with weavers and spinners form across Ontario. Keynote speakers:
 - 1) Dorie Millerson, Assist Chair of Fibre and Chair of Material Art & Design at OCAD University. Artist of complex thread sculptures of modern life. (Does neat 500 yr. old lace with needle & thread)

She passed around samples of the unwashed and spun fibre left from the event and then a sample of the clean wool in a skein. Two beautiful shawls were presented to the membership by the two teams that produced them.
