### **Exploring Multishaft Weaving: New Edition**

I had an email from Bonnie Inouye (who gave two workshops and a talk on her work in 2011) to let me know that she is in the process of preparing the 2<sup>nd</sup> edition of her book *Exploring Multishaft Weaving*, which is currently out of print. The revisions for Part 1 and 2 are ready and here is what Bonnie says:

"I finally have parts one and two ready to share. These 7 chapters work together as a book that is mainly about twills for 8 and more shafts. I plan 4 more chapters, all newly written and some new topics, so it will be a few more years until I am ready to consider having books printed. For now, I am sharing parts one and two as PDF files. People can print the pages or read on a screen or both. I thought you might be interested because of your wonderful weaving space and classes in Ontario. It has bothered me a lot that my book is out of print and the copies I see online are always more than \$100 which is absurd. If you know people who are interested, they should send me an email. I am asking \$10 for part one and \$15 for part two. I will include the latest version of part one for free for weavers who already have part one or already have the first edition. Otherwise it is \$25 for all 7 chapters (95 pages)".

### Co-Op Booth at Exhibition and Sale

Would you like to participate in our Exhibition and Sale in November but you don't want to rent a table? You are welcome to join the Co-op Table. Members may place their sale items on the Co-op Table and a commission of 12% is charged by the Guild only on items that are sold. You will also be asked to volunteer a couple of hours to set up, sell or take down the booth. The Co-op Table is open to beginners and experienced members. This is an excellent way of getting to know more guild members. It is a fun and inspiring weekend. If this is the first time you have participated, or you are doing a new craft, you must have a sample of your weaving, spinning or felting juried prior to the Exhibition. The OVWSG standards can be found on our website under the Exhibition and Sale page. This document will explain the requirements for our exhibitions and sales. It is important that your samples are labeled properly for the standards committee and I can assist you in contacting committee.

Please let me know as soon as possible if you are interested. I need some idea of our display requirements. I will have a sign up sheet for the Co-Op Table at the September meeting. ### Workshops

Jan and I have started work on the 2018 schedule. Beth will join us sometime in the next week to look at the offerings and lay out the new schedule. This is a huge job! Last year, Jan tied me to the dining room table for a solid 7 hours until we had it done (I do not sit still very well, it's a tribute to how much I love the Guild and the workshop program, and to Jan's patience; maybe this year Beth will let me have lunch -- sometimes Jan is also a tyrant). It will be debuted at the Ex and Sale; visitors get first crack! There are some new instructors and some new offerings from current and past instructors.

Meanwhile, there are still 4 months left on the 2017 schedule. Judith is recovering well from her escapade with the stairs and we have been able to take her workshops off "HOLD".

Nothing is full as of this writing, but Fibre Fest is coming soon, which often nets several registrations.

There are a few ways to look at what is available:

- 1. Go to the Calendar: <a href="http://www.ovwsg.com/?page\_id=1067">http://www.ovwsg.com/?page\_id=1067</a> (this is September; use the arrows to move between months). There you can see at a glance the titles being offered that month. If you hover over the entry you will get a summary description. Clicking will take you to the full information page for that workshop.
- 2. On any page, hover over the workshops tab in the menu at the top. A drop-down will show you categories. Clicking on a main category (e.g. "Dyeing and Colour Workshops") will take you to the listing of what is scheduled. To lessen confusion, Judy has now removed the workshops that have already taken place. In some categories you will see "no workshops scheduled" but there will still be a list of possibilities. Clicking on the "By Request" tab that comes up to the right of the main category will also take you to a list of possibilities and a link to the "By Request" page. These are workshops that you initiate yourself. It's up to you to find a group of friends. Then follow the instructions and fill the form out carefully. The more information Beth has, the quicker she can handle your request. Remember that these are still not "instant"; it takes time to find a time slot that works for everyone. Also, if you don't have a full set of students (usually 6) we leave a bit of time to advertise it and share with the rest of the world who might not know you. It's another way to make new friends!

The Executive is planning to have a "Workshop Fair" at a meeting, likely in November, where instructors will make brief presentations about their offerings, show samples and be available to talk to you about what the course is about. Watch this space for more details.

Mark your calendars: on September 9 and 10 you'll want to head for Fibre Fest, the Mississippi Valley Textile Museum's annual presentation of the best fibres, yarns, fibre tools and artisans' fibre work in Eastern Ontario.

The Festival takes place in the Almonte Arena (182 Bridge Street, Almonte). You can find a list of Festival vendors and exhibitors at <a href="http://mvtm.ca/fibrefest-2016/fibrefest-vendors/">http://mvtm.ca/fibrefest-2016/fibrefest-vendors/</a> -- and you'll want to see (and touch!) the unique items they have on offer at the Festival.

Admission to the Festival (\$5 each day; Saturday hours 10-5, Sunday 10-4) includes a visit to the Museum, which is at 3 Rosamond Street East, Almonte. Current Museum shows are listed on the Museum website, <a href="http://mvtm.ca/">http://mvtm.ca/</a>

As well, this year for the first time Fibre Fest will offer workshops in a variety of fibre arts. Adult workshops will be held on Friday, September 8 and Saturday, September 9, while children's

# The War of the Moths (vs. the wasps)

So... in the spring my husband and I were noticing moths in the house. Entering a room and turning on a light would frequently result in a moth flying up. I bought moth traps but of course they don't kill all the moths, just inform you that you (still) have moths.

Someone on Facebook posted that they purchased Trichogramma Wasp eggs and were using them in their house to end the moth cycle. I watched and asked questions, did a bit of research and decided to try the same thing.

First problem was finding a Canadian seller of the wasp eggs. My Facebook friend suggested a couple of companies and the one that answered my emails was Natural Insect Control in Stevensville, Ontario.

Stacey Hickman, an entomologist, with Natural Insect Control sent me some information, including a PDF titled "Clothes Moths: Integrated Pest Management in the Home" (I can share the PDF if you are interested). I asked about their wasp egg and moth traps and received the following information:

Clothes Moth Trap: Our Clothes Moth Trap attracts and captures adult male webbing clothes moths. Tineola bisselliella, known as webbing clothes moth, or simply clothing moth, is a species of fungus moth (family Tineidae, subfamily Tineinae). These larvae spin a web. There are other clothes moth that do not make webs.

Trichogramma wasp: The Trichogrammatid wasps are tiny parasitoid wasps that place their own eggs inside those of the moths; their larvae eat the moth eggs. Trichogrammatid wasps are harmless to humans, measuring only about 2 millimetres (0.079 in). Once moth eggs are eaten, the wasps vanish within 2–4 weeks. Trichogramma pretiosum is the species recommended for cloth moth control. T. pretiosum is the most widely distributed Trichogramma species in North America. It parasitizes a large number of butterflies and moths in a variety of habitats. It has been reared from 18 genera of Lepidoptera representing nine families.

I went ahead and placed my order, getting 2 traps (I already had a couple purchased from Lee Valley) and a card with 100,000 eggs [Trichogramma Wasp (Parasite) eggs T. pretiosum]. The eggs need to be kept cool and are shipped same day express with an ice pack and were left on my porch in a shady spot. Bill for the traps, eggs and shipping was \$103.

Shipping is limited to particular days so there was a delay between placing my order and its arrival. My parcel landed at home on July 12<sup>th</sup>. The eggs are mounted on a card that looks somewhat like 35mm film negatives. I cut up the egg cards and distributed them through the house. Every room got some eggs. I also installed the moth traps near places I had seen moths or where I was more concerned about moths (closet, stash, etc.).

Six weeks have passed since the wasp eggs were placed around the house. We are no longer seeing moths and I am declaring this experiment a success.


