Here are some of the new books you may want to come in early and check out

Stubenitsky, Marian - Weaving with Echo and Iris

2014; 233 color pages. Originally published in the Netherlands, translated in to English by Margreet Ward.

Marian Stubenitsky has published a gorgeous book on Echo weave/parallel threadings. Marian was in quest of a weave that would reproduce the iridescence found in nature. There are drafts for 4-32 shaft patterns. Chapter topics include: Structure explanation, Woven iridescence, Four-color double weave, four color double twill, multicolor double weave, multicolor double twill, turned taquete, turned samitum. Clear instructions and beautiful photos of samples make this a book a must for anyone interested in Echo weave.

Schmidt, Dagmar, Jaffke Freya - Magic Wool Creative activities with natural sheep's wool (Donation)

Description- Activities with unspun sheep's wool offer a wide range of creative possibilities for both children and adults. The colours and texture of natural wool appeal to the imagination in a vivid and inspirational manner. Dagmar Schmidt and Freya Jaffke combine their talents and experience, and show how to create beautiful pictures, figures and animals using a variety of techniques.

Telier-Loumagne, Francoise - the Art of Felt, inspirational designs, textures and surfaces. (Glenn spotted on Kijiji)

Description - Often thought of as a practical material, felt can be surprisingly versatile and even poetic. With handmade felted fabrics, subtle variations in color, texture, and volume can be achieved: threads and fibers merge almost magically to form new motifs that can then be enlivened by embroidered or crocheted details.

Françoise Tellier-Loumagne takes an original approach to the world of feltmaking, finding design inspiration in calm morning skies, spectacular sunsets, and brilliant fireworks displays. The book includes basic techniques that can be used to create felted fabrics from scratch, such as needle-felting and tufting, along with imaginative ideas for ready-made felt. With a little artistic guidance, clouds across the moon can be turned into an eye-catching necklace, or a stormy sky may inspire a striking scarf or cushion cover.

Illustrated with hundreds of images, this book will be a treasure trove for anyone interested in original textile design.

Ruck, Owyn - The Textile Artist's Studio Handbook

Description: Has a smaller section on studio set up then hoped for but has an over view of many media so will still be of interest.

Wilcox, Alanna - A New Spin on Color

Description: Have you ever tried spinning painted top or rovings only to be disappointed with the color outcomes in your yarns or finished projects?

Alanna Wilcox will clearly and artfully walk you through understanding color theory making it less intimidating for both novice and expert spinners alike.

Never before has a book presented the same dyed top worked up into 20+different approaches accompanied by easy to follow directions so you can see how the techniques look in a skein and a knitted swatch. Plus there are photos of finished products accompanying the techniques to make envisioning the spinning application even easier.

After reading this book you will be inspired to delve into your stash with a new eye and excitement for color in your spinning.

Magazine - Filzfun 2017 - 4 #56

The very interesting German felting magazine with an English supplement (like VAV use to have an English supplement) this is very inspiring full of pictures and occasionally instructions. We have a few so browse through the back issues.

Smayda, Norma and White Gretchen - Ondule Textiles, weaving contours with a Fan reed

Description - Weaving involves straight, parallel, and grid like lines, but as Norma Smayda shows, ondulé—weaving with curving warp threads—offers new directions. This is the first book on ondulé textiles, and includes clear information on every aspect, from instructions to design tips to a comprehensive history of the fan reed, the tool that makes ondulé possible. Smayda shares the details of her own learning experiences with numerous ondulé warps in a variety of fibers. More than 180 color photos also feature stunningly beautiful work by five other contemporary and two twentieth-century weavers, plus intriguing historic Japanese textiles. Also included are sections on weft ondulé, designing a fan or hybrid reed, and the thought processes behind twenty-one of the featured projects, including drafts. This reference will serve as foundation and inspiration for your ondulé weaving.

Cypher, Carol Huber- Hand Felted Jewelry and Beads: 25 Artful Designs

Descriptions Contemporary and artistic approaches to crafting trendy felt-bead jewelry are offered in this comprehensive handbook filled with detailed instructions for novices and more advanced tips for seasoned fiber artists. Techniques for creating the felted equivalent of lampworked beads, turquoise focal beads, and mokume gane look-alikes are presented along with inspiring design possibilities. All aspects of the feltmaking process are detailed, such as handling special fibers, dyeing wool, and beading on felt, as well as what types of tools are needed. Step-by-step instructions walk feltmakers through the needle-felting and wet-feltmaking techniques--including flat and three-dimensional work, inclusions, and texture applications--that are used to create wearable works of art.

Irwin, Bobbie-Weaving Iridescence colour play for the hand weaver

Description - Iridescent fabric shimmers and glows, changing colors depending on how the light hits it. Different colors appear in the folds and pleats, adding surprising layers of color to fabric. To the uninformed it appears magical and difficult, but the truth is that weaving iridescent fabric is accessible to any handweaver who knows the tricks.

Bobbie Irwin has been teaching the techniques for weaving iridescence in person and through articles for more than ten years. In this book, she delivers her most comprehensive course yet, covering the details from how to evaluate and choose yarn to achieve your desired effect to the ways weave structure affects iridescence to the best uses for your iridescent fabric. Hands-on project instructions will have you exploring what you've learned right away.

If you have been looking to add some shimmer to your weaving, this is the only book you will ever need!

I hope that inspires you and I will see you Early on Monday Oct 2nd!


